The winter months were spent in collecting specimens of plant and animal life, studying the habits and language of the Indians, hunting and trapping, and in gathering information of the country which lay ahead.

Clark's red hair excited the wonder and attention of the Indians and won for him special regard. His Negro servant, York, was also the subject of great curiosity.

The two captains had supplied themselves with homely remedies and surgical appliances, which proved valuable on many occasions to themselves and their Indian friends.

On February 5, 1805, preparations were begun for the resumption of the long, hard journey to the Pacific coast.

When the expedition was all ready to embark, early in April, a barge loaded with specimens of mineral, plant and animal life, destined for the United States government, was launched under command of Corporal Richard Warfington, with Joseph Graveline as pilot.
