National Farm Safety Week—July 23-28

Individual observation of National Farm Safety Week, July 23-28, means avoidance of accidents that interfere with vital food production. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel said today in urging care in the transportation of volunteer farm workers during the summer harvest season.

"Thousands of urban residents are volunteering to help the farmer harvest food crops this year," Farrel said. "Many of these volunteers are transported to and from the farm on farm trucks and other vehicles."

"Oregon has established an excellent record in this type of transportation and we are anxious to continue that good record. Wholehearted cooperation on the part of the operator of the vehicle and the passengers will assure the continuance of this accident-free record."

Farrel listed these safety precautions for the avoidance of accidents involving the transportation of farm workers:

Vehicles should be equipped with adequate sideboards, at least 4 foot high.

Provide tailgates. Passengers should not dangle legs over end of truck.

Be sure vehicles have good brakes and other equipment.

Observe traffic regulations at all times.

Encourage passengers to avoid horseplay enroute.

Completes 131 Missions

George B. Sipe, Aviation Radioman First Class, U. S. N. R., route 1, Beaverton, Oregon, has returned from a tour of duty in the United Kingdom where he completed 131 combat missions as radioman and gunner aboard a Navy plane with Patrol Squadron 63.

Flying the famed PB Catalina patrol bombers, the squadron ranged over European waters, searching out enemy U-boats and surface units, escorting convoys and performing a variety of other flying missions.

Sipe, who is 27 years old, is the son of George F. Sipe of Beaverton. He is married to the former Margaret V. Knapp of Washington, D. C., and has spent 24 months overseas.

J. E. Smith Now Sergeant

With U. S. Army Forces in New Caledonia—Jim E. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Smith, route 1, Tigard, Oregon, has been promoted from technician grade five to sergeant while serving with the Island Command Headquarters.

Before entering the Army in June, 1943, Sgt. Smith was a student at the Tigard Union High School, graduating just prior to joining the service. In January, 1944, after completing his basic training at Fort Custer, Michigan, he left the United States for overseas duty in the South Pacific. The sergeant served in the New Hebrides prior to his arrival at this sub-tropical base.

Since coming overseas Sgt. Smith has been awarded the Good Conduct Medal and the Asiatic-Pacific theatre ribbon. As a clerk in the headquarters he is doing his share in the delivery of vital war supplies to the fighting fronts.

Class 2 Slaughterers May Increase Quota

Any class 2 slaughterer who desires to kill more lambs than his present quota allows may now secure additional quota upon application to the OPA district office in Portland. The only prerequisite is that such slaughterers be registered with OPA as required by OPA control order No. 1.

This action was taken to permit increased kill of lambs during the season.

Timberwolf in Town Lakanen Visiting Wife

Pfc. Henry H. Lakanen, whose wife Alice E. Lakanen, lives at route 2, box 642, Beaverton, Oregon, is now home on furlough. While fighting with the Timberwolf Division he participated in the France, Belgium, Holland, Germany campaigns, and was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge, Good Conduct Medal, ETO ribbon with Bronze Star, 3 Battle Stars. Unit was awarded Presidential Citation and French Croix de Guerre.

The final phase of Timberwolf combat in Nazi land saw the men of the 104th racing to the Mulde river where the last remnants of the Wehrmacht were crushed between the Russians and the American First Army making that sector the first in Germany to be cleared and completely conquered.

This victorious division which has never given an inch is in the United States now. While here, combat veterans will be granted furloughs and will then be given training to prepare them for further battles in the Pacific against the Japanese.

Helped Rescue Patients

O. B. Neal, Signalman third class, of Beaverton, Oregon, was a member of the U. S. S. Pinkney, a Naval Transport for the wounded, that survived a suicide attack off Okinawa.

For 90 minutes after the enemy plane and its bomb crashed into the Pinkney, medical corpsmen worked frantically to rescue all but 19 of the more than 100 patients aboard; damage control parties fought fires which raged through the ship; the surgical staff completed an appendectomy which was under way when the attack came a radioman sealed in his tiny compartment by the initial concussion was doused with water thrown through a porthole to protect him until an escape route was cleared.

Under direct instructions from Admiral Raymond A. Spruance, commander of the Fifth Fleet, 19 of the Pinkney's men were given spot advancements in rating in recognition of their heroism.

Health Dept. to Inspect All Restaurants Now

Beginning July 1, the Washington County Health Department assumed the responsibility of licensing and inspecting all restaurants in the county. Heretofore, the State Department of Agriculture was in charge of restaurant sanitation, but the last legislature transferred the authority to the State Board of Health, since it was considered that restaurant sanitation was basically more of a health problem than an agricultural problem. However, in all counties with a population of over 10,000, the county Health Department will have jurisdiction, and the county Health Officer, or his deputy, the County Sanitation, will be required to inspect each eating or drinking establishment at least once every six months.

By January 1, 1946, all restaurants operating under this act, except itinerant restaurants, will be graded as A, B, or C, and will be required to display their grade emblem in the front window or door.

Mayor Urges Men to Join

Mayor E. H. Masters yesterday urged Beaverton men to join the U. S. Maritime Service and help keep the Merchant Marine staffed with seamen urgently needed to sail merchant vessels leaving west coast ports.

Drainage District No. 2 Organized in 1882

In checking over the records this week at the Court House, Hillsboro, it was recorded, that a number of pioneers living in Beaverton and vicinity, filed the original petition on May 3, 1882, asking the County Court to organize a drainage district (later known as Drainage District No. 2) to drain the beaverdam land along Beaverton Creek.

Later, J. C. Hall, County Surveyor, made the survey on May 15, 16, 17 and 18, 1882, and filed his report. In due time Drainage District No. 2 Washington County was duly organized.

Beaverton Creek was cleaned out yearly, big crops mostly onions and horseradish were grown down to and including 1908; then for a period of 27 years Beaverton Creek was not cared for until 1935 when the property owners re-organized; elected the late Father Heasaker of St. Marys president, the late Pat J. Kelly of Sylvan Vice-president and Elva Rosi-Graham of Beaverton, Secretary-treasurer; a WPA loan of \$4000 was obtained from the government; Earl E. Fisher was appointed Superintendent and with a crew of 30 men placed the creek from Huber Avenue North to its source in good shape.

After 10 years without cleanup work, Beaverton Creek is in bad condition again; high waters of spring recede very low; crops of tansy and brush with drifts clog the stream—with late and poor crops.

For best results the creek should be cleaned up each year. Several property owners of late have been discussing this action—later on a meeting should be called and all property owners along the 6 mile drainage district be invited. Good drainage is essential for best crops.
