Forrestal Hails

Aid for Wounded

12,000 Iwo Casualties May Be Fully Restored.

NEW YORK.—Secretary of the Navy James V. Forrestal declared that as many as 12,000 of the 15,300 fighting men wounded on Iwo Island might be completely restored to health, with reports indicating that between 6,000 and 7,000 had returned to their divisions before the fall of Iwo.

He spoke to 1,500 workers attending the first report luncheon of the Red Cross 1945 War Fund of Greater New York.

Out of every 100 navy men and marines wounded in the first three years of war, 98 have recovered, Mr. Forrestal said. Among the marines 75 have been able to return to active combat duties.

"We will do everything in our power to keep that record good," he promised. "I mention it here because of a tendency to regard all casualties as fatalities. It is easy, for example, to speak of our 'losses' at Iwo Jima as 19,900 men, forgetting that of this total, 15,300 were wounded."

Going into other figures, the secretary who visited the hospital ship, Samaritan, off Iwo the day after D-day, estimated that in his opinion "there was in excess of 24,000 Japanese" on the island. He said, "as of today there are 21,500 actually killed."

He paid tribute to the Red Cross saying he had accepted the invitation to speak at the lunch "because I felt an obligation to make some return for the work which I saw the Red Cross doing in the Pacific." He said that with every marine division moving into combat there is a Red Cross unit of four to five men, "usually over fighting age, but they still have fighting qualities," who landed with the marines at Tinian, Saipan, Kwajalein and Iwo. He also referred to the first Red Cross club in the Philippines which was opened to 3,000 American and Philippine troops 21 days after the Leyte landing.

Stolen Bonds Find Their Way Back Home Again

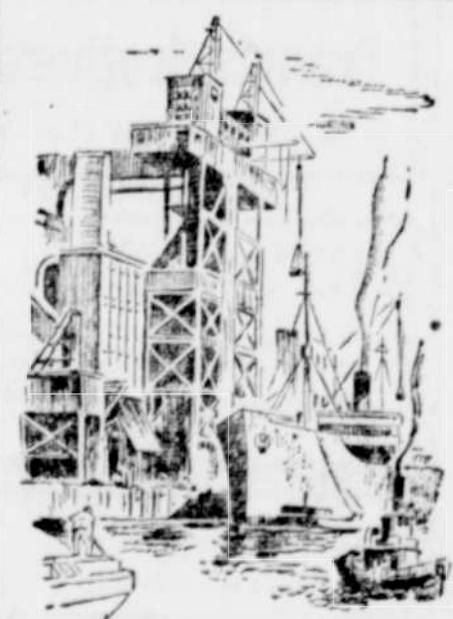
TEXARKANA, ARK. — The Rev. David E. Holt's \$250 worth of war bonds, like Little Bo Peep's sheep, came home.

Patton Claims Our Tanks Best

General Goes on Record in Defense of U. S. M-4; Resents Criticism.

WASHINGTON.—Lt. Gen. Patton, commander of the Third army, has gone on record as vigorously defending the U. S. M-4 tanks. These have been criticized as being too light, says the United Press.

Patton said the Third army tanks had rolled up a score of approximately 2 to 1 over German tanks. A substantial part of the enemy tanks were the heavy Tigers or Panthers. Many of the German tanks were dug in defensively, while American tanks were attacking.

Patton's views were given in a letter to Lt. Gen. Thomas T. Handy, deputy chief of staff.

"It has come to my knowledge that certain misguided or perhaps deliberately mendacious individuals, returning from the theater of war, have criticized the equipment of the American soldier," he wrote. "I have been in command of fighting units since the 7th of November, 1942, and may therefore claim some knowledge of the various types of equipment.

Statement Incorrect.

"With reference to the tank, either M-5 (light) or M-4 (medium), it has been stated at home that these tanks are not comparable with the German Mark VI, the so-called Panther and Tiger types of tanks. This statement is wholly incorrect for several reasons.

"Since August 1, 1944, when the Third army became operational, our total tank casualties have amounted to 1,136 tanks. During the period we have accounted for 2,287 German tanks, of which 808 were of the Tiger or Panther variety, and 851 on our side were M-4.

"These figures of themselves refute any inferiority of our tanks, but let me add that the Third army has always attacked, and, therefore, better than 70 per cent of our tank casualties have occurred from dug-in anti-tank guns, and not enemy tanks, whereas, the majority of the enemy tanks put out have been put out by our tanks.

"It is patent that if a Tiger tank with an enormous thickness of armor were put at one end of a village street and engaged in a fire fight with an M-4 tank at the other end, the M-4 tank would not last. However, the great mobility of the M-4 actually enables it to circumvent the slow and unwieldy Tigers and not to engage in a slugfest match but to attack them from the rear.

German Tanks Too Heavy.

"With the advent of the heavy, cumbersome Tiger tank, the German, in my opinion, lost much of his ability in armored combat. These tanks are so heavy and their road life so short that the German uses them as guns and not as tanks—that is, he uses them on the defense against our armor, whereas we invariably try and generally succeed in using our armor on the offense against his infantry, which is the proper use of armor.

"Had the armored divisions which accompanied the Third army across France been equipped with Tiger tanks, the road losses would have been 100 per cent by the time we reached the Moselle river. As it was, the road losses on our long-lived tanks were negligible.

"In mechanical endurance and ease of maintenance, our tanks are infinitely superior to any tank in the theater of war. The outstanding advantage which our tanks possess over the German tank is the mechanical traverse and stabilizer, through the use of which we get most of our kills."

Secret Weapons Again Crop Up in Japan Reports

WITH THE MARINES.—It seems that whenever our old enemy "Japan Military" gets stuck for something to tell the home folks, they ignore the unfavorable battle reports and blow terrible-sounding smoke in the collective Nipponese ear.

Latest in the series of "Just wait until we get our hands on the marines after they stop choking us" announcements, is on new secret weapons which will demolish the United States in the vague future.

First awe-inspiring monster is a new plane, controlled by radio, four times as big as the Superfortress, and capable of "carrying a bomb load which could destroy an entire American city." We don't like to give advice to the enemy, but unless the Japs confine their bombing attack to some city about the size of Infinitesimal, Ariz., (pop. 14) they are due for a terrible shock, according to the Leatherneck.

Another destructive force soon to be unleashed by the Japs is a "mortality weapon" about which they say no more. Need more be said?

Black Market Beef Is Dumped on Country Road

CLEVELAND. — Gus S. Ingram, health officer of Lake county, said officials seek suspected black market meat operator who dumped 1,000 pounds of quality beef on a roadside.

Office of price administration attorneys were expected to subpoena 180 renters of cold storage lockers in tracing the origin of privately-owned beef carcasses and other meats.
