"I FE" was the subject of the Lesson—Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 22.

The Golden Text was, "Now that the dead are raised, even Moses shewed at the bush, when he calleth the Lord, the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. For he is not a God of the dead, but of the living: for all live unto him." (Luke 20:37, 38).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson—Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses. Laying up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life." (I Tim. 6:12, 19).

The Lesson—Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Be watchful, sober, and vigilant. 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Describes Trip Through Paris

(Continued from last week)

David Lofgren wrote: "The Hotel des Invalides where Napoleon is buried is most magnificent church like building of excellent proportions. Coming in to the right of the entrance is a room with the crypt of Joseph Napoleon. The windows are such that a rather blue light fills the room. Then down a short corridor lies the sarcophagus of Marshal Foch—a tremendous bronze casket borne by several life-size figures. Then there was a room with Jerome Napoleon's casket and I believe that is the one Hitler brought back from Austria after France fell to the Germans. In the center of the building and sunk several feet into the ground is Napoleon's sarcophagus. It is a magnificent red marble affair, yet elegantly simple. On the floor around it is a mosaic with a sun pattern. All around it are statues of angels. In front of the tomb and on the main level is a replica of the altar at St. Peter's in Rome. It is a wonderful thing and very well set off by yellow stained glass windows which throw a golden light. In Paris it seems that every effort has been made to produce the most beautiful buildings imaginable. Wherever you go in Paris there is something really beautiful. Each building is a work of art. Sunday morning I went up to the Church of the Sacre Coeur (Sacred Heart). It is a relatively new building having been built after World War I. It is located high on a hill and overlooks the entire city. Constructed of gleaming white stone, is really a wonderful sight. While I was in there a mass was in progress, which added a great deal to the enjoyment of the visit. From there I went down towards the Place de la Madeleine, where the Madeleine Church is located. It is built on the order of the Parthenon in Athens. There was a service being conducted on the steps with all the gorgeous color of the Roman church. I took several pictures as it was an unusual sight. Then in the afternoon I took a tour to Versailles to see the famous palace. It is difficult to imagine the tremendous beauty of that building. It is still being brought back to its original condition since the liberation of France. Many of the paintings are being brought out of the storage places and every day items are being replaced. The grounds are really wonderful, although much of the area has gone into disrepair. We saw Marie Antoinette's "Petit Trianon"—her own lodge, as well as the mistresses' house. We drove back to Paris through the forest of St. Cloud. That just about took care of Sunday and I needed to rest up. On Monday I had decided to go back to some of the places visited on the tour and get a better look at them. So, soon it was time to leave. You can well imagine that I was mighty tired walking so much, although everyone uses the Metro as much as possible. The Metro is a very excellent system of subways and we can get around very easily, even though we don't read French. All the lines are very well marked and there are very good maps and diagrams put out by the Red Cross.

Monday night I had to leave and got out to the airport to make reservations for the flight back to Brunswick. I stayed at the airport—they have facilities for transient passengers. The weather became very dull Tuesday morning but we tried to take off, getting only as far as Rheims and had to turn back to Paris. We returned at 9:30 and waited around for quite a while until the announced that all flights to Germany had been canceled. By that time a large number of passengers was waiting to get passage and fortunately I was booked for a seat, so didn't have to worry like some did. For once, the army didn't give all the preference to officers. If a private had a seat booked, no one outranked him, for if some high ranking officer wasn't there when they checked the passenger list, his name was dropped and the next person added, regardless of rank. That made many of us feel good, for so often the officers get all the consideration all the time at the expense of the others. Well, the weather didn't clear up, so after dinner we went back to Paris until 7 o'clock and went out again. On Wednesday morning flights were again postponed and I finally got off to Wiesbaden that afternoon. The trip was very pleasant, arriving there at 4:15. Stayed overnight there and took off for Brunswick at 9:30 the next morning, arriving here about noon. When Col. Haight saw me afterward in the office he said he was glad to see me back as he was going to the Riviera and he had to wait until I came back. All in all, it was really a wonderful trip and I shall always
