Equipment Standardized For New Gas Kitchen

Standardization of equipment on a national scale for the new freedom gas kitchen to provide every possible convenience for the homemaker is the nation-wide project sponsored by the gas industry, announces J. A. Dodd, district manager of Portland Gas & Coke company.

"Formerly," declared Dodd, "there has been little dimensional coordination in the equipment of various supplies, and the assembling of the units for a finished kitchen presented many difficulties in the way of securing smooth streamlining."

"To eliminate these difficulties and to simplify the planning and building of better kitchens in the new homes or old," Dodd explained, "the gas industry secured the interest of the steel and wood cabinet industry and our gas appliance manufacturers are working out unification of dimensions so that cabinets and cabinet-sinks might be built in sizes to fit smoothly with gas ranges and refrigerators in practically all kitchens. By virtue of the measurements agreed upon, each unit can be placed in relation to its most convenient use to obtain good functional kitchen design."

Dodd laid special emphasis on the fact that in instances where finances do not permit the complete kitchen, or a fully remodeled job at the beginning, the homemaker may have the kitchen planned and started under the basic standardized dimensional plan, adding equipment correctly over a period of two or three years by following the program worked out by the gas industry.

Second Shriner's Picnic For Children "Alumni"

Plans are well under way for the second annual picnic of Shriner's hospital for Crippled Children "alumni." The gathering will be held at Laurelhurst park in Portland on Sunday, August 19. A picnic lunch will be held during the noon hour, and a variety program will begin at 2:30 p. m. to be followed by visiting. Nearly 115,000,000 gal Gas Used in First Six Months

Gasoline consumption in Oregon during the first six months of 1945 totaled 114,928,046 gallons, compared to 105,850,877 gallons in 1944. Secretary of State Farrell announces. The gasoline used for the first half of this year was an increase of about five percent over the consumption for the same period of 1944. Taxes paid amount to \$5,746,402.39.

During the month of June, Oregon used 23,081,257 gallons of gasoline which was 14 percent over the June consumption a year ago and was the heaviest June since 1942 when gas use totaled 23,129,800 gallons.

Schouboe Awarded Medal

Ensign Richard M. Schouboe of route 1, box 952, Beaverton, Oregon, was awarded the following decorations in a mass presentation ceremony at the Naval Air Station, Alameda, California, in July: Distinguished Flying Cross and four Air Medals.

State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott reported this week that there is cash in the state treasury as of July 31, 1945, aggregating \$52,961,695.11, exclusive of bond investments of \$24,217,998.40, carried in cash account. Total bond investments included in the cash total was \$39,157,574.38. Unemployment compensation trust funds deposited with the United States treasury aggregate \$71,875,000.

READY FOR TOKYO—This is the "explosion-on-impact" of the new Chemical Warfare Service fire bomb—a jetisonable fuel tank filled with jelly gasoline, adopted by the Air Forces for special targets, particularly of the Japanese type. The fuel tank is released like the ordinary auxiliary gas tank suspended under the wing of a P-47 fighter plane.

Smith Sees Lots of Action

Aboard the USS Birmingham in the Pacific—Leonard Loyd Smith, watertender, second class, USNR, Beaverton, Oregon, serves aboard this ship which can look back on 121,500 miles of fighting the Axis from the invasion of Sicily to the battle of Okinawa.

The Birmingham struck at Okinawa targets six months prior to the landings and gave fire support to minesweepers clearing the approaches to the island. During the campaign she sank thousands of tons of shipping.

Operating with the famed 3rd and 5th Fleets and Task Forces 38 and 58, she bombarded Wake Island, participated in air strikes on Tarawa, took three hits at Bougainville, shell-shocked Shortland Island and hurled her might into the assaults on Saipan, Tinian and Guam.

At Mindanao, she sank 3,000 tons of shipping and assisted in the destruction of another 3,000. At Eniwetok, she blasted four Jap planes out of the sky and scored hits on 11 others.

Following the battle for Leyte Gulf, the Birmingham was damaged for the second time. She had gone alongside the USS Princeton to battle the fires resulting from a direct hit. The ships lay in a trough of the rough waters separated by about 50 feet when a terrific blast from an exploding bomb and torpedoes in the Princeton rained death on the decks of the Birmingham.

After three months for repairs, the Birmingham steamed out again to take part in the Iwo Jima operation and the battle of Okinawa.

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Fought 60 Days and Nights at Okinawa

Gordon Heughen, Jr., seaman, second class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Heughen, route 1, Beaverton, Or., fought aboard this battleship USS Colorado for 60 days and nights at Okinawa.

The Colorado expended there more ammunition in support of ground troops than in any of the previous occupation support and bombardment operations in which she participated. She took up her station off the beaches seven days before the invasion to help in the softening-up bombardment, and then for 60 days she continued her relentless pounding of enemy positions. She helped beat off numerous air attacks launched against units of the Fleet operating in the area.

Task force and ground unit commanders showed numerous "well done" messages on the officers and men for the effectiveness of their fire.

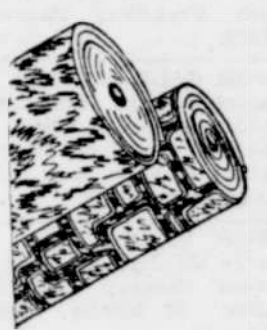
