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Lewis and Clark

The Great American Odyssey

The junction of the Yellowstone and Missouri was reached on August 3 and they made camp on the same spot where they had camped on April 26, 1805. The canoes were unloaded and their goods spread out to dry, for many of the articles were wet and some had spoiled. They had intended to camp there until Captain Lewis arrived, but their fierce enemies, the mosquitoes, thought otherwise. Captain Clark decided to move to a spot that was free of the pesky insects and where game was more plentiful. He left a note on a forked stick at the junction of the rivers informing Lewis of his intentions.

Sergeant Pryor, with Shannon, Hall and Windsor, caught up with Clark on August 8 with the bad news that the Indians had stolen all their horses, leaving them afoot. They had made their way to the Yellowstone, where they had built two bulwarks of willows and buffalo hides, and paddled downstream to catch up with Captain Clark and his party. Three days later Clark's party encountered two men, Dickson and Hancock, who were on a hunting and trapping expedition up the Yellowstone. They were the first white men the expedition had encountered on its entire trip.

To the joy of everyone, Captain Lewis and his men overtook Captain Clark and his party on August 12, when the reunited party set out in earnest down the Missouri. Two days later a landing was made at a Mahaha village and soon they were greeted by their old friends, the Mandans and the Minatarees. Captain Lewis was still incapacitated on account of his wound, so Captain Clark had to assume the responsibilities of the party.

Captain Clark discovered that the various tribes had been fighting among themselves and chided them for disregarding his counsel. He was able to get a promise from hereafter and behave themselves. An invitation was extended to the Indians to choose one of their chiefs to go to Washington to visit the Great White Father. Indian politics finally conferred that honor upon Shahaka (Big White).

Colter was given his discharge that he might join a trapping expedition to the upper Missouri. He had been one of the most valuable men of the party. In later years he was the winner of a race for life when the vengeful Blackfeet, after stripping him of all his clothing, pursued him for six miles over a plain studded with prickly pear. He discovered the wonders of the Yellowstone park, and joined Andrew Henry's party in 1810 for further adventure. He died in Missouri in 1813 at the age of thirty-eight.

Sanitary Tips

Article 5

Up to now we have discussed three of the four major offenders in the transmission of disease through food and food handling. This time we will discuss the last and sometimes the worst offender—MAN himself. The United States Public Health Service lists twenty-five communicable diseases that may be transmitted through food.

In order to better understand how to prevent such diseases in restaurants, etc. the following grouping of diseases and means of transmission may be interesting.

(1) Insanitary glasses, dishes, and silverware and the exposure of food to coughing, sneezing and spitting may spread the common cold influenza diphtheria, encephalitis, measles, mumps, pneumonia, infantile paralysis, scarlet fever, septic sore throat and tuberculosis.

(2) Failure of restaurant employees to wash their hands after each visit to the toilet may result in the spread of bacillary dysentery, amoebic dysentery, paratyphoid fever, typhoid fever, and food poisoning.

(3) The use of unpasteurized milk products (milk, cream, milk shakes, cottage cheese, etc.) may be responsible for diphtheria, bacillary dysentery, paratyphoid fever, scarlet fever, septic sore throat, tuberculosis undulant fever—or any other disease that the cow or the milkster and the milk handler might have.

(4) The lack of proper screening and the exposure of food to flies may cause bacillary dysentery, amoebic dysentery, typhoid fever, and paratyphoid fever.

(5) The improper storage of food and the lack of rat control may result in paratyphoid fever, typhus fever, infectious jaundice and food infection and poisoning.

You will note that several of the diseases may be spread in many ways in a food establishment. Thoroughness in personal hygiene and sloppy methods, the food handler can easily contaminate himself as well as the people for whom he is preparing or serving food.

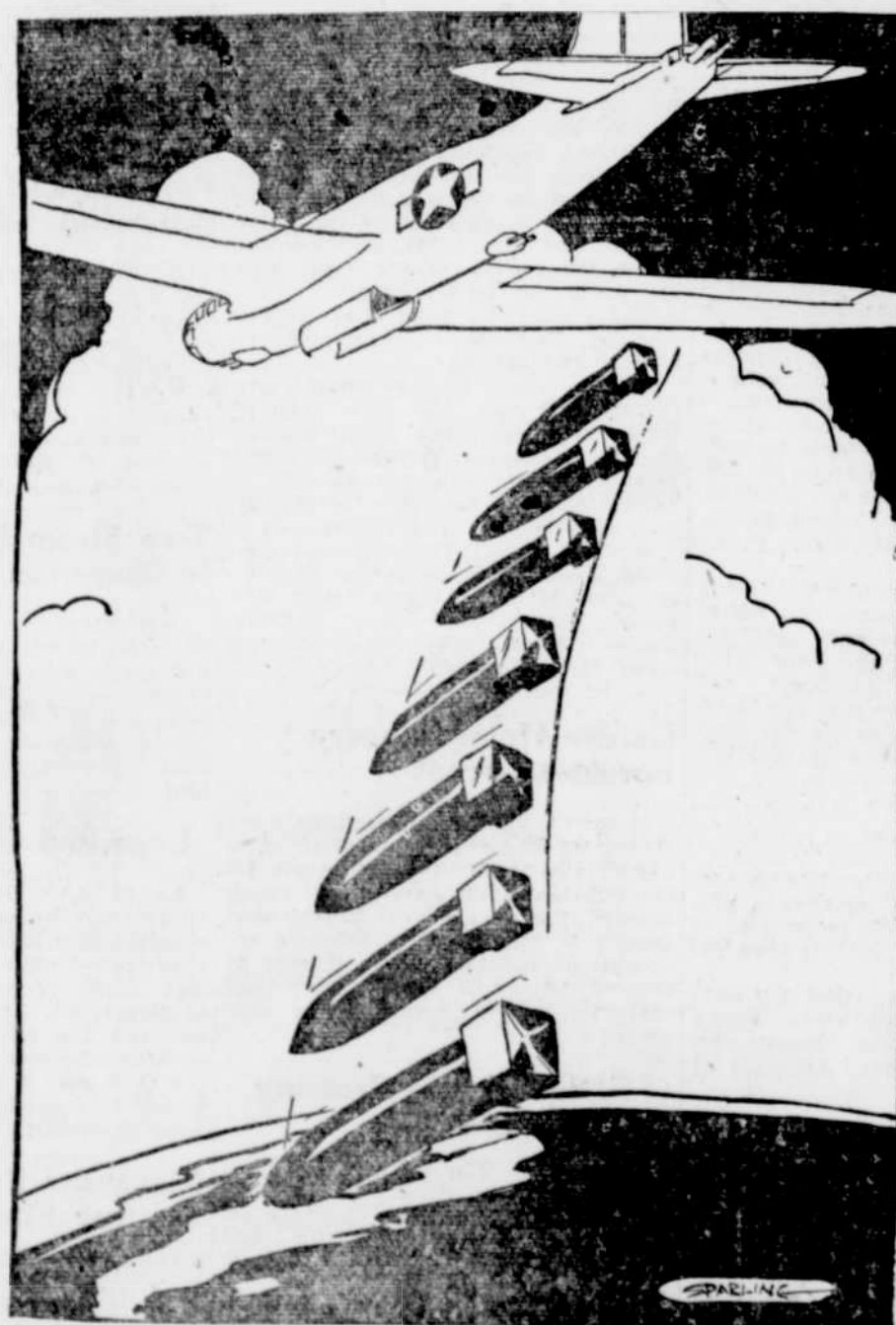
