Dorion—Pierre Dorion, a roving French frontiersman who had acquired Indian ways and had taken a Sioux Indian woman as wife, met Lewis and Clark on June 12 while on his way to St. Louis. The captains persuaded him to join the them as a Sioux interpreter. The party camped at the mouth of the James river and sent Dorion up that stream to contact a Sioux village and bring some of the chiefs and braves to a council with them. At this parley medals and presents were distributed among the chiefs. Dorion stayed with the Indians at the request of the captains, to try to bring about peace between the various tribes and endeavor to induce some of the chiefs to visit the Great White Father in Washington. When asked by Captain Clark what he would like for a present, Dorion said that a jug of whisky would be most acceptable.

Dorion's son, Pierre, was present at this council. He too, had an Indian woman for wife. Pierre Jr., joined the Wilson Price Hunt party in 1810 as an interpreter. Accompanying him were his Indian wife, Marie, and their two children. Late in December, 1811, beside an ice-bound stream in Eastern Oregon, Marie gave birth to the first child with white blood in its veins born in the "Oregon Country." The infant died on the trek over the Blue mountains.

In the fall of 1813 Pierre Dorion and the rest of a trapping expedition on Snake river were killed by the Snake Indians. Marie and her two children were the sole survivors. is a thrilling story itself. She died Sept. 5, 1850, and was buried in the little Catholic church in St. Louis, Oregon.

She was one of the unsung heroines of the primitive West.
