**Bits of News
About Our Boys**

Among those from Beaverton who have received their honorable discharge are Charles Joseph Hemrich, gunners mate, 2nd class of eighth and Franklin, from Bremerton Wash. Also James W. Wray, electricians mate, Beaverton. Also Bennie H. Thomas, coxswain, route 1, Beaverton.

Aboard the USS Cecil—Roy H. Doyle, 21, machinist's mate, second class, route 3, Beaverton, aided in the disembarkation of troops of the 1st Cavalry Division from this attack transport in Tokyo Bay in the initial stages of the occupation.

The Cecil participated in operations at Kawaalein, Hollandia, Tarawa, Aitape, Guam, Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

Pearl Harbor—Anderson I. Byrd, carpenter's mate, second class, Beaverton, has been serving with the 85th Naval Construction Battalion here, climaxing, with the war's end, a long period of duty that begun in the Aleutians.

In cold and heat, this battalion of Seabees performed the strenuous, difficult work necessary to victory. It spent 17 months in the Aleutians, from there came to the South Pacific. When peace came, its men were preparing military equipment in the New Hebrides for shipment to areas nearer the fighting fronts.

Aboard the USS Wadleigh in the Western Pacific—L. V. Wilson, 21, sonarman, second class, USNR, of Beaverton, was aboard this destroyer when she sailed into Tokyo Bay in the vanguard of American occupation forces.

The Wadleigh, commissioned in October, 1943, took part in actions at Alinglapap and Ebon Islands and Mille Atoll, in the Marshalls; Roi and Saipan in the Marianas; the Palau; Okinawa and the Kyushu, and was part of the task force that hit the Jap homeland.
