FRESH VEGETABLES

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Hiroshima

Turning off the main road we drive out to see a little more of the wreckage in the residential districts. Already the people have begun to rebuild, making little shacks out of the wreckage around them. The people look at you rather sullenly, but there are quite a few smiles. The little kids, knowing nothing about the whole thing except that they are attracted to the Yanks, wave and holler at you. But I wonder what these people think inside their hearts and minds about us, probably each one of them had some loved one or friend killed in the bombing. I think if it were an American city that the people would act much differently and try to take revenge for their suffering.

The hearts of the people there must be bitter, although they may not show it in action. I have read, though, that Hiroshima was the most immoral city in Japan, so it could be looked upon as the wrath of God. Never-the-less, when you see these people building a little lean-to of twisted sheet metal, and cooking on bonfires it makes you think. In fact the whole thing makes you think, and the thoughts are not happy ones. You can just see Portland in the same condition. It does make you realize what war is to people and not just to soldiers, and you know that there must never be another war. All along the roads are people pulling carts with a few pieces of furniture in them, coming back to what? You can see where there were shops and factories by the melted china, glass and machines. The heart of Hiroshima just isn't. There is just a flat field of ruins acres in area. If I went on for another four pages I could never describe the destruction that took place there in just a few seconds of hell. That's the part that is hard to get into one's head, that all of this was done by one single explosion and in the space of just a few seconds. Perhaps I am mistaken about the seconds, but it wasn't very long in comparison to the time required to build that city and to raise the generations that died there.

Leaving the city on the other side the same conditions were evident as these we saw upon entering the city. The damage became less evident, but as we came to the mountains that surrounded the city we could see many black spots as if a forest fire had struck just in spots then jumped on. The mountain which I speak of are like the mountains around Council Crest, but they certainly look different now. Well, we drove on out through the suburbs and as we got farther from the

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city a load seemed to lift from our minds and spirits. It was a perfect day, and still early morning. The highway, which is a fine one, goes right along the water and is certainly a beautiful drive. All along are stacked supplies, parts for airplanes, and everything along that line scattered along for miles. We passed through three tunnels and they were packed with equipment. I guess they figured we were going to bomb Hiroshima at some time. We traveled altogether 140 miles round trip and the whole distance we hardly left town. What I mean is that all along the highway are houses and people. Every bit of low land is cultivated except the little spot upon which the house is built. The
