This is the consensus among State

in 48 hours."

Staff Sgt. Earl J. Goetz, 28, of 8220
Rhodes avenue, is typical.

height two inches up to 5 feet 11 1/2.
I also gained 20 pounds."

Yanks Plant American
Flag on Fujiyama Crest

TOKYO.—Old Glory flies from
Fujiyama—planted there September
21 by a valiant band of 10 officers
and enlisted men of the 27th infan-
try division after a tortuous climb
in snow, wind, hail, fog, and rain.
The rare atmosphere at the top of
Japan's 12,635 foot sacred mountain
played tricks on their vision, the
climbers said. Stones and shoes ap-
peared green-blue. Eyeballs burned.
Heavy fog cut their vision to arm's
length.

Fourteen set out to make the
climb. Two aggravated old leg in-
juries and were forced to turn back.
Two others turned back to help the
injured down the mountainside.
