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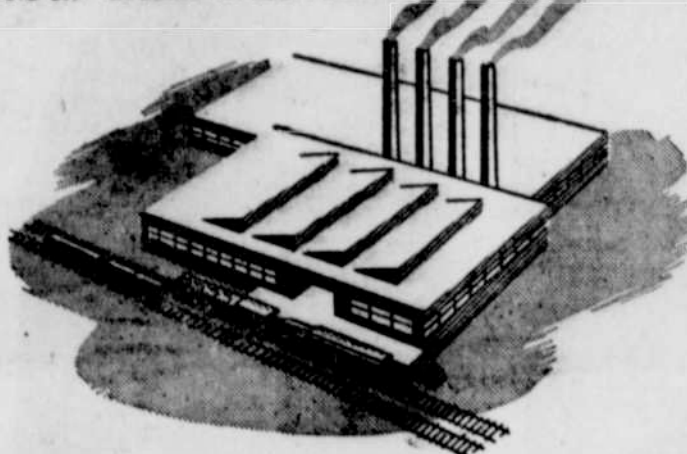

SANITARY SIPS

In our last article on purification of rural water supplies we discussed general construction of wells and springs. This time we should discuss methods of improving and disinfecting the small water supply.

A spring supply is difficult to disinfect since the water is flowing constantly; the location and method of collecting and storing is more important. Primary attention must be given to the exclusion of all surface water. A diverting ditch should be dug several feet from the spring area and completely around it on the uphill side.

If the spring area is wide spread and slow in flowing, it may be necessary to install underground collecting tiles which will convey the ground water to a collecting box. The tile lines may be laid in gravel if necessary to assist the flow, but great care should be taken to use lines should be chlorinated before covering with an impervious clay or concrete layer to exclude surface water.

If the spring is fairly well centralized, it will be sufficient to use a collecting box alone, of a size that will adequately cover the spring area; in this case the back side or bottom, depending on flow, will be open or perforated to allow entrance of the water.

Disinfection of a well is relatively simple. For every 1000 gallons of water in the well, one should add to the well approximately one pint of Chlorox. White Magic, or Master X (S.25%), or about 1 1/2 pints of Purex or Sanox, etc. (3%).

This should be mixed thoroughly and allowed to stand for 24 hours before pumping out. It is necessary to pump only until the water is not excessively distasteful to taste.

In chlorinating the well, the chlorinated water should be circulated by pumping it from the well and discharging it back into the well thru a hose or pipe, before the standing period, is begun; it should also be pumped through the entire system—tanks, coils, etc.—running the water through the various faucets until the odor of chlorine is discernible.

Norblad Busy

Washington, D. C.—Representative Walter Norblad (R) of Oregon appeared before the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations and urged increased appropriations for recreational facilities in our National Forests and for the utilization of forest products.

Mr. Norblad stressed the deterioration of the recreational facilities in the National Forests due to the prosecution of the war and the need for reopening the areas to accommodate the thousands of people who are and will in the months to come seek outdoor relaxation. The Representative called particular attention to the service men and women who are resuming their peacetime occupations and are planning on enjoying the full benefits of the parks in our national forests.

In presenting his argument for increased appropriations for the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, Mr. Norblad reminded the Committee that one of the biggest and most destructive fires that ever raged in the Northwest—the Tillamook burn—occurred in the First Oregon District, which he represents in Congress. He urged that as little time as possible be lost in bringing this and other non-productive areas back into timber production and that the Pacific Northwest Forest Experiment Station be adequately financed to carry out planting research on the Tillamook and similar devastated areas.

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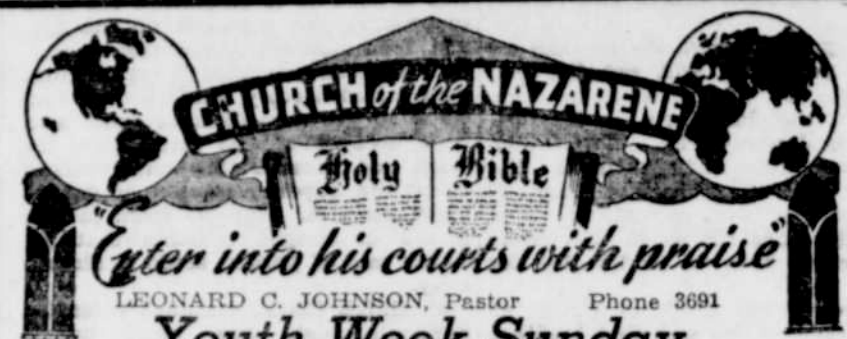
