Washington County Food For Famine Committee Organized

A Washington county Food for Famine committee is being established for the purpose of conserving wheat and fats and oils for the next 90 days. A meeting will be held next Monday, April 8 at 8 p. m. in the County Court Rooms, at which time the group will determine what recommendations will be made for home and industrial savings in Washington county.

The committee is being asked to establish county food conservation goals in proportion to the state goals, which call for the saving of 20,000 tons of wheat and 500 tons of fat and oils in Oregon. This is an over-all reduction of 40 per cent in purchases and use of wheat products and 20 per cent in food fats and oils.

Three committees are suggested in the county to include a consumer committee, trade committee, and education and publicity committee. The purpose of this meeting is to introduce the program and after it has been outlined to break the group up into sub-committees to decide on what action is fitting and what other activities can be carried out.

Joseph K. Carson, former mayor of Portland, is state chairman. He was appointed by E. Harvey Miller, state Food for Famine relief manager. Conservation measures for bakeries, public eating places, food dealers and food processors are suggested and will be considered by the representative committees as well as those suggested for consumer groups.

Anyone interested is invited to attend the public meeting.

Yesterday's Insurance Not Enough

The Fire Insurance Industry is, warning home owners of the drastic rise in building values that has taken place since 1939, and of the consequent underinsurance problem. The National Board of Fire Underwriters declares: "Since 1939, building values—particularly home values—have risen from 30 percent to 50 per cent in practically every state in the union. In some communities, the increase is even greater. Home furnishings and personal jewelry—have also risen in value. "Most property owners throughout the nation, since they have not built nor moved in recent years, have overlooked the vital necessity of increasing their insurance to protect the increased value of their own property."

"Yesterday's insurance cannot protect today's property values. It is the responsibility of every insurance representative to bring the seriousness of this situation to the attention of every policy holder concerned."

"Should fire strike these property owners while they are still underinsured, they face tragic and needless losses—losses that might well represent the savings accumulated by years of effort."

During the next five months, fire

insurance advertising will stress present day property values. Every property owner will have called to his attention the creeping menace of rising property values to the outdated insurance policy.

PEPPER

In an effort to secure more pepper for the consumer, the OPA has announced the following price increases: New York port-of-entry whole black pepper, from 10 to 15 cents per pound—whole white pepper, from 11 1/2 cents to 23 cents per pound. Consumer will pay more for pepper as a result of the increases, but the cost of living will be very slight since the consumption of pepper is so small.

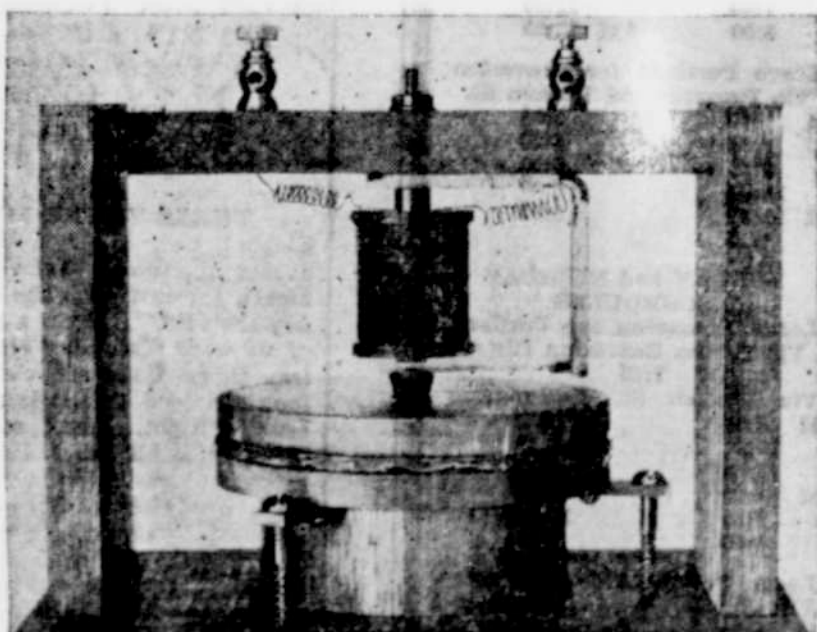
