

More Homes Obtain Electric Service

Completion of ten separate power line extension projects during February brought electricity to 35 homes and farms in Washington county, Ralph Easter, Tualatin Valley division manager for Portland General Electric company, reported this week.

More than 25,000 feet of wire was strung and 104 poles were set on jobs, which brought service to families in the East Banks, Witzhaz, Dille, West Haven, Cedar Mills, Kinton, Cherry Grove and Mountaineer districts, as well as the Hillsboro area. Major portion of the construction work was done by Roper Electric company, Hillsboro, and Tigard Electric company, Tigard, under contract with PGE.

Easter said that line equipment and materials are still difficult to procure and many remaining line extension projects can be handled only as rapidly as critical construction items become available.

Employer's Tax Rates For State Compensation Being Mailed

New 1946 tax rates for employers covered by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission are being mailed out during the last week of March. Administrator Silas Gaiser announced today.

About two-thirds of the 11,376 employing units subject to the unemployment law are included in the experience rating system and most of them will secure lower rates despite a heavy claim load in the closing month of 1945. The other firms have not had the requisite three years or more employment experience to qualify for rates lower than the normal 2.7 per cent pay roll tax.

Most of the 2,090 firms which had the lowest rate of 1 per cent last year are believed to have sufficient reserve to qualify for the 0.5 per cent rate which takes effect in 1946 following legislative action last year. The amendment also provided that no increased rates may be imposed.

Despite withdrawals from the state's benefit fund totalling more than eight millions in the past five months, about 70 millions remain in reserve. With the three percent floor for 1946 fixed at \$17,869,623, little danger is seen of employees losing their reduced rates. The floor is figured on the basis of past five years' average annual taxable pay rolls.
