Current School Problems Topic At Monthly Meeting McKay Community Club

Current school problems were discussed and officers elected at the monthly meeting of the McKay Community Club Friday night, April 5, with a record attendance of 42 present in the Community building. Bids for addition of two large rooms and a basement extension to take care of the rapid expansion of school attendance will be opened April 17, reported Bruce Denny, School board chairman. Federal matching funds to also build a proposed auditorium and gymnasium have been refused for the current year he reported. Plans call for completion of the new rooms in time for school next fall. Harry Ellander, also member of the school board, joined in the discussion. Both promised that every effort would be made to secure all the improvements possible in view of the limited bond and high building costs. Community and school proposals discussed at the meeting included the possibilities of organizing a hot school lunch program for McKay, setting up organized youth groups such as scouts or campfire girls, and the merits of purchasing a school bus. A committee composed of Mrs. Frank Fanno, chairman; Carl Voss, school principal; Mrs. Bernice Strayer and Bill Reynolds was named to investigate the school situation and make recommendations for such facilities as should be included in the school improvements to provide lunch accommodations. Youth group representatives will be asked to meet with the young people and parents to discuss their programs. The bus situation will receive further consideration from the school board. McKay Community Club officers elected at the meeting include President, Mrs. Edna Blithen; Vice-President, Lance Strayer; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. W. D. Staats and Custodian, Mrs. Kramer. Coffee and

cake were served after election of officers and the meeting closed with group singing led by Mrs. Staats and her accordion. As a follow-up of the community meeting, a number of men from McKay and Hiteon community made a trip to the old Hiteon school April 7 and hauled playground equipment to the McKay school where it will be made into swings and parallel bars next Sunday. The equipment remained from the consolidation of Hiteon and McKay schools last fall.

Audio-Visual Aids Subject At Wash. Co. Council P.-T. A. Meeting April 9

Audio-Visual aids to Education were discussed at the final meeting of Washington County Council of P.-T. A. held in Forest Grove Tuesday, April 9. Following a film explaining the use of movies in the class room and part of one illustrating a type used, Mr. Marshall, Superintendent of Schools in Forest Grove told about and demonstrated various audio aids and other visual aids. Mrs. Frederick Young, State Legislative chairman, spoke on national and state legislation and the need of P.-T. A. participation in legislative matters. Mrs. Claude Hagey, State treasurer spoke briefly. Mrs. Young installed the following newly elected officers: Pres. Mrs. Paul Patterson; 1st Vice-President, Mrs. Carl Ott, Forest Grove; 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. R. L. Dustan, Tualatin; 3rd Vice President, Mrs. Norton Peck, Beaverton; Secretary, Mrs. B. M. Snavely, Garden Home; and Mrs. E. E. Kalmbach, Bonny Slope. As the president's expenses to the state meeting are being paid by the state, the Council voted to send Mrs. Dustan as a second delegate. Mrs. Snavely was chosen alternate.

Last Sunday, April 7, was a great day for Beaverton's village blacksmith. L. F. Humburg—50 years ago, April 7, 1896, Mr. Humburg began blacksmithing work back in Missouri for many years, then took Horace Greeley's advice and came West. In Washington county he ran a blacksmith shop at Cornelius until 1913, when he moved to Forest Grove, later to Hillsboro and finally located at Beaverton in 1925 where he has been busy for the past 21 years. A blacksmith has to be well posted on "know how" on fixing everything. He says his line of work has changed much during recent years—from horse shoeing, wagon tire setting, etc. to mostly "tinkering jobs" and repair jobs—also he can tell many funny instances—Just last week, a fellow came in the shop and asked: "Do you do welding?" You bet, for the last 50 years!

Jack Kelly returned from a trip through the automotive plants of Detroit. He spent most of his time inspecting the Kaiser-Frazer Willow Run plant and returned with the assurance that cars would begin to roll out of this modern factory by the end of April. While there Mr. Kelly saw the first Rototiller come off of the assembly line. The production from this line is 150 a day and he expects his first shipment to arrive next week.

An idea of the capacity of this converted bomber plant at Willow Run may be gleaned from the 9,784 foot long assembly line of the Frazer. There are 29 miles of overhead crane. It is possible to load out 78 carsloads at one time and a whole train can unload under one roof.
