Garden Club Meet

Beaverton Garden Club will meet in the IOOF Hall at 11:00 A. M., April 19th, With Mrs. J. R. Smarthaite and Mrs. T. W. Blakeney as hostesses.

A plant sale is scheduled which will be open to the public at 1:30. Members are asked to bring only the best material for the sale carefully wrapped and priced and to avoid bringing in plants that are, or could be garden pests.

Also on the program is an informal Daffodil and Primrose show for members only. Mrs. John Holmes, President, raised a flat of choice Primrose seedlings last spring and in the fall gave each member of the club one of the plants. These are to be brought in for exhibit now.

At the March meeting the members voted to again sponsor a 4-H Club member this year and also started plans for use of a shelf in the local library for housing the Garden Club collection of books on horticulture and gardening. These books will be available to anyone for use in the library itself but will not be issued for taking out.

May 1 is the final date for filing a farm plan indicating intention to participate in the 1946 agricultural conservation program. Oregon farmers are reminded by Harvey E. Miller, chairman of the state AAA committee.

Farmers who desire assistance in carrying out practices to conserve soil and water, check erosion and build up soil fertility will need to file a plan with their county AAA committee before that date, Miller said.

Report from counties indicate that farm operators, along with another year of all-out production to meet world need for food, also are planning an increased conservation program to restore fertility lost through heavy wartime output.

Up to April 1, more than 15,000 Oregon farmers had applied on farm plans for county committee approval of conservation practices under the 1946 program, Miller estimated.

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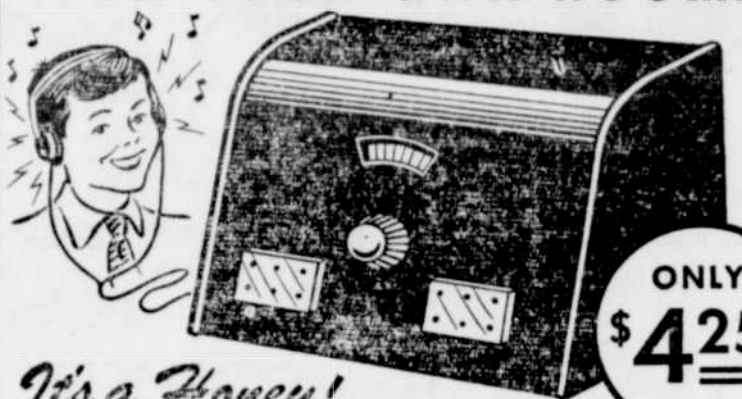
