Memorial Lecture At U. of O.

Eugene. (Special) The annual Don R. Mellett memorial lecture, in honor of a martyr to honest journalism, will be delivered at the University of Oregon on the evening of May 7 by Palmer Hoyt, editor and publisher of the Denver Post. Mr. Hoyt, until last February was publisher of the Oregonian, and himself a leader in the crusade, will speak on the freedom of the news.

Mr. Hoyt is a graduate of the University of Oregon, class of 1923. He attended Linfield college before coming to the University and served in World War I, rising from a private to a sergeant major.

He spent his first three years in newspaper work as a telegraph and sports editor on the Pendleton East Oregonian. In 1926 he joined the staff of the Oregonian. He served successively as copy-reader, reporter, drama editor, night editor, executive news editor, managing editor and for eight years, publisher.

Special Fishing, Hunting License

A 25 per cent or more service-connected disability entitles any war veteran who is a resident of Oregon to a special rate on fishing and hunting licenses in this state. Veterans' Affairs Director Hugh E. Rosson reminds disabled veterans. The rate is 50 cents for a fishing license, 50 cents for a hunting license and one dollar for the combination.

Application is made to the Oregon State Game Commission, 1634 S. W. Alder, Portland. The veteran must submit a certified or photostatic copy of his honorable discharge, and a statement of his disability from the Veterans Administration.

He must also have been a resident of Oregon for a year prior to entry into service, Rosson said. The special rate applies to disabled veterans of all wars.

Application blanks are available at the game commission offices; at the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library building, Salem, or the Portland office at 101 Oregon building. County service officers also should have these blanks on hand, Rosson said.

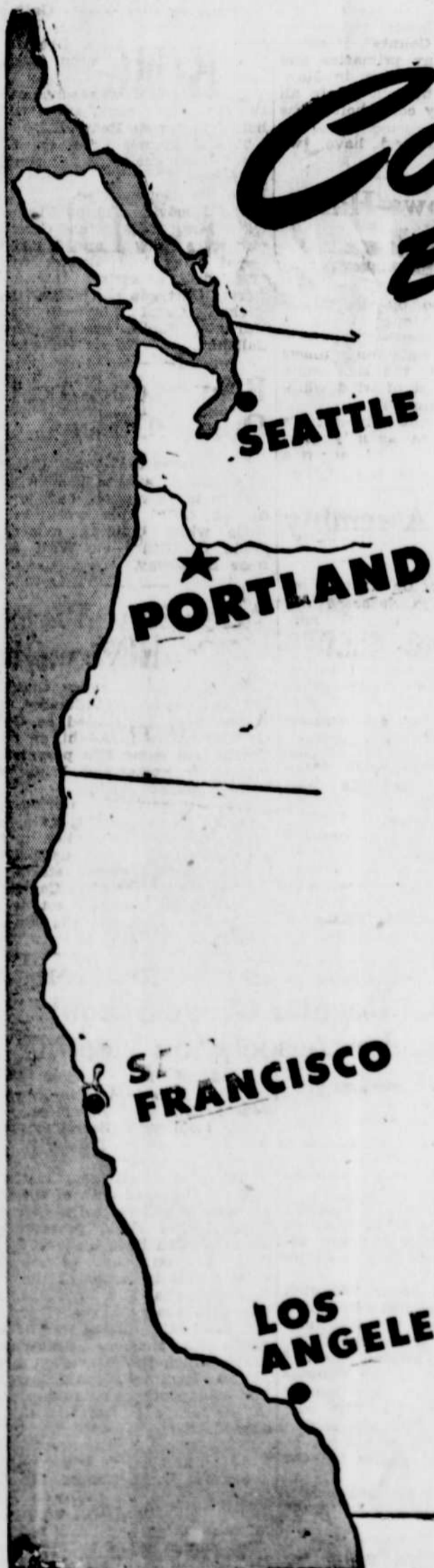

COMMERCIAL ELECTRIC RATES CUT AGAIN!



Portland Area Leads "Big Four" Coast Centers with Lowest Cost Commercial Power

Effective with meter readings commencing April 24, 1946, PGE's general commercial and industrial customers formerly served under schedules No. 33, 34 and 35 will be billed for power service under PGE's new commercial schedule No. 33. This new schedule reduces revenues from affected customers about 8 per cent.

Among the "Big Four" Pacific coast shipping, trading and industrial centers—Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles—commercial electric costs generally are lowest in the Portland area including all surrounding territory served by PGE. Examine the chart at bottom for comparison of costs in typical consumption and demand brackets.

Thus local business is in a favored position for using electricity to produce more goods of better quality at lower cost, to increase the efficiency of office workers, to speed up and improve merchandising processes.
