Fisher Fights For 4 Lane Auto Traffic

Wash. County Demands Better Transportation

Way back in 1919, 27 years ago, a highway was built from Forest Grove to Portland. Since then, Washington county has more than doubled in population—the Wilson River road has been completed—and still the people of Washington county are compelled to travel the same two lane highway—the most congested and dangerous in Oregon.

Fisher says that construction of a new four lane traffic highway should begin now at West Slope and continue Westward to Beaverton, Huber, Aloha, Reedville, to Hillsboro, thence Westward to Cornelius and Forest Grove thence to Dilley and the County line near Gaston. Nearly every week in the year ambulances from wrecks on the narrow two lane Tualatin Valley Highway speed with their victims to hospitals. We believe it is time to halt these traffic tragedies and on behalf of Washington County demand 4 lane traffic construction NOW! Not only on the dangerous Tualatin Valley Highway, but on the Capitol Highway also—between Tigard, Roaners Rest, Cipole, Sherwood and Middleton.

Washington county is not going to wait another 27 years for action, Mr. Fisher says.

Advice To Vets Seeking Carriers Licenses

Veterans planning to enter the taxi or motor freight hauling business in Oregon will find it easier to obtain permits if they first familiarize themselves with state "common carrier" regulations before applying. This was the advice given this week by Public Utilities commission officials to Hugh Rosson, state Department of Veterans' Affairs director.

Generally speaking, existing carriers are "sympathetic" toward veterans entering this business, according to A. F. Harvey, superintendent of motor transport for the PUC. But the first thing the veteran should know, Harvey said, is that the motor transport act requires that he show his business will not impair the ability of existing carriers to adequately serve the public and will not be contrary to the public interest.

By consulting with Public Utilities commission officials beforehand, the veteran can receive advice which may prove helpful to him in avoiding "pitfalls" when he goes up for the hearing on his application to operate, Harvey told Rosson.

One veteran in John Day was turned down on his application, Harvey said, because of his lack of "competent testimony" to show the need for his projected freight line. He then consulted with PUC officials, who advised him to prepare his case thoroughly for the next hearing. He did this, and when he appeared at a later hearing his application was approved because he had a considerable number of shippers present to testify in his behalf, Harvey said.

Applications for permits should be made to George H. Flagg, Public Utilities commissioner, Salem. However, personal assistance will be given at any of the six branch offices in the state, Harvey said.

Hearings are assigned frequently at various points in Oregon, making it unnecessary for applicants to travel to Salem or Portland. Applicants will be notified when and where to appear, according to Harvey.

Safety Check Program Started This Week In Ore.

Planned as the first nation-wide project to implement the traffic safety program proposed by the President's Highway Conference, held last week in Washington, police officers of Oregon this week inaugurate a Safety Check program, designed to focus public attention on the need for safe vehicles in modern traffic.

Sponsored nationally by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the program in Oregon is under the direction of Chief Harry M. Niles, Portland, state coordinator, and Robert S. Farrell, Jr., Secretary of State, whose office is handling field activity for the program.

Miss Allingham is majoring in English.

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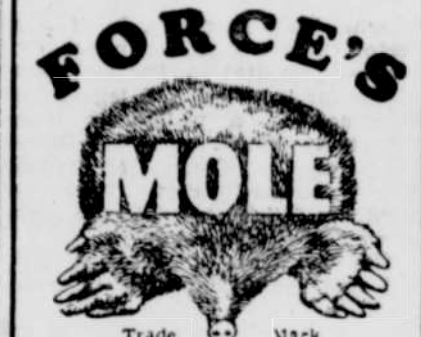

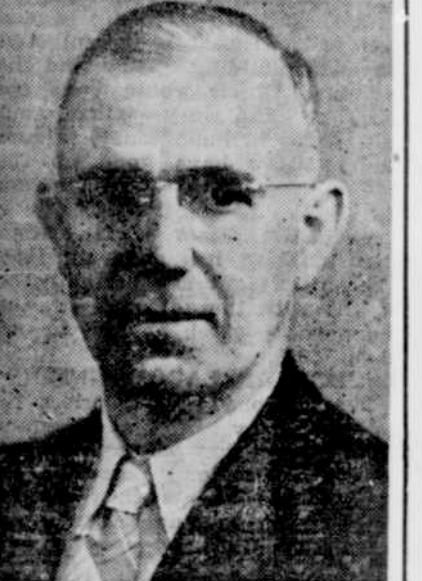
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
