

## Old Water Bond Issue Retired; Last \$15,000 This Week

A milestone in the City history was reached the first of this week with the payment of the final \$15,000.00 of the old water bond series. This was part of the \$28,000.00 which has been paid since the passing of the \$200,000.00 Water Bond Series 1946.

Of the total \$4,000.00 was maturity bonds and \$24,000.00 were called.

Of the total called the State of Oregon held \$9,000.00 and the Commercial Nat'l. Bank of Hillsboro held \$15,000.00.

Some delay was experienced in delivering the recent issue owing to the fact that it was the first bond issue which John W. Shuler, recognized bond authority, had been called to pass upon for a municipality which was operating under the new "Streamlined Charter" which was passed by Beaverton voters in November, 1943, and which became effective January 1, 1944.

The charter was prepared by the League of Oregon Cities in cooperation of P. L. Patterson, city attorney.

## All Oregon Exhibit By Artists

## Returned Vets Asked To Check Life Insurance

Returned servicemen who held commercial life insurance policies during their terms of military service should check with the insurance agents to make sure that all provisions of their policies are still in force, the state Department of Veteran's Affairs advised this week.

Purpose of such checkup is this: 1. If the veterans' insurance policy contained certain special benefit provisions—double indemnity, waiver of premium or disability income—the policy may have stipulated that such provisions would be terminated or suspended automatically because of military service. In such cases, the veteran should make application to have any terminate or suspended provisions restored.

2. Veterans who served in the armed forces before Sept. 2, 1945, but failed to report their status, may have paid premiums for provisions that are no longer in force. By reporting to their insurance agents, it should be possible to obtain refunds for such over-payments.

3. According to some contracts, reinstatement of suspended provisions will not be made until the veteran notifies the company that he has been discharged from the service.

Officials of the Department of Veteran's Affairs said that some insurance companies are now sending out notices to this effect, to ex-servicemen holding commercial policies.
