Plans For "Canyon Of Light" Parade

Plans for an all-Oregon "Canyon of Light" parade, to be held in Portland July 13 in conjunction with the world premiere of Ernest Haycox's "Canyon Passage", were launched today at Portland, premiere headquarters.

In keeping with the pioneer theme of the Oregon-written, Oregon produced outdoor epic, the parade will feature mounted riders in western costume, authentic Indian tribes, covered wagons, ox carts, and all the related color of Oregon's early days.

The entire procession, headed by the top Hollywood personalities coming to Portland for the opening of the Technicolor Walter Wanger production, will march through a dazzling canyon of lights, formed by mammoth searchlights banked along the parade route and shooting skyward.

Communities throughout the state are invited by Wayne Leland to join the premiere city in "turning out the attic and joining in the fun."
 "All Oregon," Leland said, "is crammed with fascinating historical articles, and this is our chance to trot them out and show them to the entire country."
 Early-day vehicles, particularly covered wagons, ox-carts and buggies; costumes worn by trappers, miners, lumberjacks, bankers, gamblers and their ladies of the 1850's together with anything else reminiscent of Oregon's colorful pre-statehood period, are particularly sought by the parade committee.

Participants and contributors are invited to submit entries to Leland at the "Canyon Passage" premiere headquarters, 721 S. W. Park Street in Portland.
