Garden Home Cannery Starts Third Year

On July 3 the Garden Home Community Cannery embarked on its third year and first full season of service to the surrounding communities.

Many new additions have been made in preparation for the largest amount of processing yet experienced. A new automatic sealer has been acquired and partitions and ventilating system will keep steam out of the preparation room while new screening will eliminate bothersome insects.

Because of this new equipment which will speed production, there will be room for several hundred new members in addition to the present 500. Membership fee is \$7 and entitles you to all benefits of the cannery, one of which is the group purchasing of fruits and vegetables. These are bought from farmers and sold to members at wholesale prices. The produce is delivered to the cannery, ready for preparation. Salmon and tuna will also be purchased this year in that way and canned for members.

The cannery has engaged a new manager, John Beoletto, who has had much experience in this field with such concerns as Libby's, Tea Garden, and Agen Frozen Foods.

For members who are unable to come to the cannery to work, custom canning will be done. Information on this and other subjects may be obtained by calling the office, Clifery 2242.

Membership is spread over the communities of Beaverton, West Slope, Oregon City and Oswego. Spurred by the scarcity of food, the officers of the cannery are making a serious attempt to aid members of the community to combat inflation by taking a part in this project.

The tuberculous patient should place himself under medical care as soon as he is aware he has tuberculosis. And he should do exactly what the doctor says. Ordinarily, the doctor will recommend that he enter a hospital for the tuberculous because in such a hospital everything is arranged to enable him to rest most comfortably. Occasionally, for one reason or another, the doctor will not insist upon his entering a hospital. This, however, does not mean that the patient does not have to rest. He must follow the instructions of the doctor and the members of his family must realize how essential it is for the patient to follow medical advice.

Tuberculous patients frequently begin to look quite well and healthy shortly after treatment is begun. But don't ever be deceived by looks where tuberculosis is concerned. It is not the patient's looks, but the condition of his lungs that is important in tuberculosis. The doctor, through X-ray pictures of the lungs and other tests, knows when it is safe for the bed rest regimen to be modified. The doctor's advice, and not the comments of well meaning friends, should determine the patient's adherence to bed rest.
