in Salem Friday, September 6,
starting at 10 o'clock, announces
L. J. Allen, assistant state club
leader at O.S.C.

approximately 50 to 60 heavy
beefes, 100 lambs and 100 hogs
fattened by club members. A sift-

sentatives will inspect all animals

Civil Service Examinations

Federal Civil Service announces
examinations for permanent
probational appointments to Fireman,
Marine and Oiler, Marine posi-
tions.

Persons who desire permanent
positions in the Federal service
will have an opportunity to file
for civil service examinations lead-
ing to permanent appointments
with permanent classified civil
service status in these positions,
in the Portland Engineer District.
The entrance salaries for these
positions are—Fireman, Marine,
\$1.22 an hour, and Oiler, Marine,
\$1.26 an hour.

Applicants for these examina-
tions will be graded on the basis
of their experience and training—
for no written test is required.
Applicants must be between the
ages of 18 and 62, except that
these age limits may be waived
for veterans and under certain
conditions for war service indef-
inite employees.
