Shall We Live Beneath An Overpass? Highway Survey Proposes East End Crossover

The State Highway Commission has surveyed a new highway to become Highway No. 99, through Beaverton, Oregon.

This could do Beaverton a lot of good but as it is laid out now it will do the city nothing but harm.

The stakes indicate that the highway would come through the east end of town cutting off the present Bertha-Beaverton highway with a fill leading to an overpass over the east end of Broadway and the S. W. Canyon Road.

The plan is to have the Bertha-Beaverton highway run parallel to the fill and enter Broadway under the pass.

This scheme would put us in a position similar to some of the surrounding towns and all the traffic would whisk by over our heads.

Another important objection is that it would cut through and ruin some of our best business property. Property in which substantial investments have been made.

Three weeks ago the Enterprise called attention to the need for widening the present Canyon Road to four lanes from West Slope to Redville to handle the heavy traffic. Surely this is a

610 Students Enroll In Tigard Public Schools

290 pupils registered at Tigard grade school on opening day, September 9. Principal Errol Hassel reports that this is the same number who registered last year on the first day of school, but an increase in enrollment is expected during the year. The 6th grade is the largest class with 43 pupils; thirty-seven first graders entered this fall.

The first three grades were dismissed at 10:00 Monday morning. The other grades at 11:00 following registration. The regular class schedule began Tuesday at 1:00 o'clock assembly at which time a motion picture was shown the student body.

320 students registered at Tigard high school during a three day registration period, September 5, 6 and 7, according to T. R. Fowler, principal. This number is slightly smaller than the 324 who entered at the beginning of school last year, but Mr. Fowler expects an increase in the next two months.

The class memberships are as follows: Freshmen—89, Sophomores—84, Juniors—74, and Seniors—73.

An assembly was held Tuesday morning and was followed by the class schedule with shortened periods.

There will be no school held Monday and Tuesday, September 16 and 17 at either Tigard grade school or Tigard high school because of Teachers' Institute. The grade school will also be closed September 18 for the Physical Education Institute held at Beaverton.

Public Hearing On Fluid Milk Prices

A public hearing to consider revision of minimum prices paid producers for fluid milk and wholesale and retail prices to consumers in the Washington County area, will be held in Forest Grove, in the Chamber of Commerce at 1:00 p.m., September 17, 1946, according to notices issued by the Milk Control Section, State Department of Agriculture. E. Eugene Chadwick, field representative of the Department is in charge of arrangements for the hearing which is expected to establish official data for minimum milk and cream price schedules under conditions now prevailing in this area.

The Washington County hearing is one of a series being held by the State Department of Agriculture to investigate costs and other factors affecting the production and distribution of milk in the bottle and can trade following the removal of ceiling price regulations of the Office of Price Administration and the cessation of milk subsidy payments by the Federal Government July 1st.

Younger Generation Started On Year's School Career; Increased Enrollment Shown

Three-Day Holiday Next Week For Graders; Two Day Rest For High School

For the most part, the east Washington county schools are well launched on a new school year. The exceptions to this are the McKay and Raleigh schools which are being held up until Sept. 19 by construction difficulties and the Washington County Teachers Institute to be held in Hillsboro September 16, 17 and 18; and Sylvan School which will not open until Sept. 26. This delay is also due to unfinished construction.

The grade schools of the county are getting a three day holiday for the institute while the high schools will have only Monday and Tuesday off.

While several schools are over flowing with children others have not increased enrollment as much as they had anticipated though each school feels that their full enrollment has not been reached nor will it be until the crop picking and harvesting is over.

Beaverton High School

The Beaverton High School has a total enrollment of 559 which is about 75 more than they had last year. They anticipate an increase of about 25 yet to register.

The enrollment is divided as follows: Freshmen, 189; Sophomores, 155; Juniors, 119; Seniors, 96.

There have been no changes in the staff since the list was given in the paper two weeks ago.

Beaverton Grade School

The Beaverton Grade School has the very large enrollment of 485 children. These are divided as follows: 77 in the first grade which is divided into three rooms of 25, 26 and 26 each; 72 second graders, also divided into three rooms; 63 members of the 3rd grade divided into 2 rooms; 69 in the fourth grade in two rooms; 54 in the fifth grade in two rooms; 50 in the sixth grade divided in two rooms; 47 in the seventh grade in two rooms and 56 in the eighth grade in two rooms.

There has been a late change in staff, since Mrs. Velva Wheeler, who was to have taught the 5th grade was unable to come. Miss Louise K. Smith, recently graduated from the College of Idaho was chosen to take her place.

The music teacher, Miss Jucht, has her music program already well under way. The band met for the first time Friday.

Miss Davies, the principal, stated that things were getting off to a fine start and the year stretching ahead had every prospect of being a successful one.

Sylvan School Opening Delayed; Construction Problems Responsible

Sylvan school, which was expected to open Sept. 16 has been held up, because they could not get construction material for the two rooms they are adding in the basement. It is hoped the work will be done by Sept. 23, so that school may start then.

When the two new rooms are finished it will not be necessary to use the principal's office for a class room as was done last year. CPA would not give its permission to build a permanent structure this summer to take care of the added enrollment and did not give permission to partition off the basement into rooms soon enough for the school to get the work done in time.

The school is putting in a new heating system which will adequately handle the heating problem for the coming year.

All the teachers with the exception of three will be new this year.

McKay School Not Open; New Furnace Delays

The McKay school is not yet open. They tried to start last Monday, Sept. 9 and the children and teachers all came expecting to stay. However, they are installing a new furnace and as one of the class rooms is in the basement temporarily the competition of the noise from the furnace installation proved to be too much for the school, so after the children were registered they were dismissed until Thursday, Sept. 19 when they will reconvene to start the school year.

Registration brought a total of 92 children divided 23 in grades one and two; 21 in grades three and four; 22 in grades five and six; and 26 in grades seven and eight.

It is expected that 26 or 27 more pupils will be registering.

The staff consists of Mr. Vose, principal, and 7th and 8th grade teacher; Mrs. Vose, 3rd and 4th grade teacher; Miss Scott, 5th and 6th grade teacher; and Mrs. Walters, 1st and 2nd grade teacher.

Raleigh School To Open September 19

The Raleigh School is not yet open. There is a 55 x 77 addition being constructed which will be three new class rooms and a kindergarten when it is finished. However, they hope to have one room finished by Christmas so it looks as if the present accommodation will have to do for some time.

School will open here Sept. 19 after teachers' institute.

Kinton School

The Kinton School, one of the smaller schools of the county, has 28 pupils divided evenly with 14 in the primary room under Miss Hazel Kuiken and 14 in the upper room under Miss Onelta Doher.

Both Miss Kuiken and Miss Doher are new this year to the school.

Hazeldale School

The Hazeldale School is a 3-teacher school. Total enrollment here is 56. Divided 19 in the 1st and second grade under Mrs. Anna Rasmussen; 19 in the 3rd and 4th grades under Mrs. Laura Mack; and 18 in the 6th, 7th and 8th grades under Miss Elva Howey.

Although school started only last Monday the work is well under way. The Young Citizens League an organization of pupils to handle the various phases and problems of the school is going strong. Evidences of their work was seen in the pleasantly decorated bulletin board, and in the play ground control.

An interesting science unit on insects was being carried on. Several collections of them were in evidence and a very large beetle was thriving on a diet of spinach in a glass jar.

A community entertainment to be put on by the upper grades and members of the community around Halloween has been started. Here is a school indeed well launched on what holds promise of being a very successful year.

Cooper Mountain, Dist. 94

The Cooper Mountain School, District 94, began school Sept. 9. Total enrollment is 53 in two rooms.

There are 33 pupils in the primary grades under Mrs. Louise Rycken and 20 in the upper grade room under Mrs. C. J. Dernbach.

These are divided: first grade, 11; second grade, 11; third grade, 6; fourth grade, 6; fifth grade, 5; sixth grade, 6; seventh grade, 5; eighth grade, 3.

The Cooper Mountain school has installed oil stoves this year which are a great improvement over the wood burning variety used before. They have also put in a new lighting system and secured new desks. So the school is all spruced up for the new year.

Feeling that a PTA did not include enough of the community in school activities the district has organized a Community Club which included every one in the community to work with and through the school.

The club, which was organized in May has had a picnic each month during the summer and will have its first regular meeting Friday, September 20. Let's see everybody out.

Cedar Mill School Begun

The Cedar Mills School started Monday, September 9. Total enrollment is at present 80 but it is felt that more students will come later.

These are divided as follows: 1st and 2nd grades under Mrs. Esther Gustafson, 22; 3rd and 4th grades under Mrs. Edna Green, 24; fifth and sixth grades under Mrs. Elsie Underwood, 22; and 7th and 8th grades under Mrs. Margaret Stroeve, who is also the school principal, 12.

Hot lunches will be served to the children beginning Sept. 23. Mrs. Bessie Cover is to be the cook. These lunches, which are a complete lunch including milk are served for 65c a week.

Barnes School Enrolls 48

The Barnes School has an enrollment of 48 pupils. It is a two teacher school. Mr. J. E. Becker is the principal and upper grade teacher and Mrs. Ruby Abbot is the primary teacher.

The pupils are divided as follows: first grade, 14; 2nd grade, 7; 3rd grade, 8; 4th grade, 3; 5th grade, 3; 6th grade, 9; 7th grade, 3; and 8th grade, 1.

Both of the teachers are new to the school this year. They feel they are well started on a very satisfactory year.

Redville Grade School

The Redville Grade school opened September the 9th, with an enrollment of 102 which is a decrease from last year. However, they feel this will increase as soon
