New Businesses Must File With Wage Board

Thousands of new business enterprises in Washington, Oregon and Alaska are estimated to be in violation of wage stabilization regulations through failure to apply for approval of their wage schedules, John B. McCourt, Chairman of the 12th Regional Wage Stabilization Board, said this week.

McCourt said all operators of such new businesses, employing more than eight workers, should apply immediately to the regional board for approval of their wage schedules or they will be subject to severe penalties in the form of income tax disallowances.

"The order requiring prior approval of wage schedules for new businesses exempts employers of eight or fewer workers but if the employment rises above eight, application for approval of the entire wage schedule must be filed within 30 days," McCourt pointed out.

Copies of the wage regulations governing new businesses and new job rates may be secured from the Regional Wage Stabilization Board offices in Seattle or from the nearest Wage and Hour Division office of the U. S. Department of Labor.

Naval Reserve Officers Organize

The first Pacific Northwest chapter of RONS, organization of reserve officers of all Naval Services, was organized Sept. 6th, with the formation of the Portland Chapter. A charter application was sent to the National Headquarters of RONS in Washington, D. C. by Lt. (jg) Paul Orris, USNR, 6525 N. Concord Ave., Portland, who was elected temporary chairman.

Membership in RONS is open to all reserve officers of the Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard, including the women's reserves. The organization which has the approval of Navy Secretary Forrestal was established to assist in the development of the Navy peacetime reserve program and to act as a medium for reserve officers to officially express their attitudes on Naval policy.

The Portland Chapter will work closely with the Naval District Representative in the development of the Oregon Reserve Training Program. A meeting is scheduled in the near future to select permanent chapter officers and to initiate the local program.

All officers of the Naval Reserve services in the Portland area are invited to join the Portland chapter and may obtain information from Chairman Orris at WE 4265.
