## Reason We Had No Lights

The area just east of Beaverton to Sunset Road was without electricity from 8:45 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Wednesday, September 11, because a Bertha-Beaverton line fuse was blown.

In checking with the Portland repair department of the Portland General Electric Company it was learned that the Hillsboro line department is raising the voltage on the primary circuit and re-distributing loads in order to improve the electrical service in the area. It was felt that the line fuse was blown because the load was over-balanced. However, linemen are puzzled because the fuse did not blow until after the peak load time, 6:30 to 7:00 was passed.

Work on improvement of service is continuing. Certainty was expressed that the dips and flickers apparent at the peak load time will be eliminated when the work is completed.

## Committees Are Organized

Local advisory committees to assist the Oregon USDA Wage Board in administering the specific wage rate ceiling on plum and plum harvesting have been organized throughout the ceiling area, according to Aiden E. Orr, Executive Officer of the Board. One of the chief functions of local committee members is to inspect orchards and make recommendations where individual adjustments are asked to relieve hardships. Orr added:

Counties covered by the specific regulations for plum and plum harvesting are Washington, Yamhill, Polk and Marion. Orr explained that at two hearings held to determine community sentiment toward a plum and prune rate ceiling for all valley counties, representative producer sentiment in support of the specific regulation was not sufficiently manifested outside the four counties named to justify inclusion of a wider territory. Other producing areas in the Willamette Valley are governed by the general farm wage regulations, which provide a maximum of 85 cents an hour, or the piece rate equivalent.

Maximum rates established for the ceiling area are as follows: For picking plums and prunes from the ground, 25 cents per lug box of 56 pounds. Where shaking and picking is a combined operation the maximum rate that can be legally paid is 35 cents for a 56 pound box. Where the ceiling rate is used, the order requires that the shaking be a complete job, Orr emphasized, and not merely a final shaking to bring down a few remaining plums or prunes after the main part of the job has been done by mechanical pickers. An hourly ceiling rate of one dollar is provided in the order for jobs incidental to the plum and prune harvest, such as shaking, bucking, truck and tractor driving, and loading fruits on sleds or trucks.

As in all specific ceiling regulations that define maximum piece rates by some quantity unit, the prune order provides that if any different sized container than a 56 pound lug is used, the maximum rate must be equivalent to and cannot exceed the maximum set forth in the order. Except for cabins, fuel, lights, water, and such facilities customarily furnished in fruit harvesting operations, no bonuses, gifts or unusual perquisites of any kind can be used to increase wage payments.

An adjustment request can be made by either laborers or farmers. When a situation is encountered which unduly lowers work-earnings, then that is sufficient basis for making an adjustment and for the payment of a prior approved piece rate.
