BRUSHES BEST DRIED BY

TURNING BRISTLES DOWN
The best way to dry all kinds of household brushes after washing or using is to turn them with their bristles down instead of on their backs, says Myrtle Carter, home demonstration agent-at-large at O.S.C.

The common practice of turning brushes on their backs to dry allows water to stand where the bristles are fastened, tending to loosen them. Brushes with wooden backs are most likely to be harmed by this practice.

Many brushes, brooms included, may best be hung up to dry and kept in that position when not in use. Flat brushes including paint brushes and brooms are hung with bristles down. Many brushes are made with a hole or screw eye at the end of the handle for this purpose.

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
