Eighty men and women from many communities turned out for the first meeting of the Tualatin District training course for "Scouters" and "Cubbers" Wednesday evening, Oct. 30, in the Beaverton Grade School.

The training course staff is made up of local men assisted by Byron Walker, assistant scout executive for Washington county, and J. E. Monroe, scout executive in charge of leadership training for the Portland Area Council.

The course is still open for enrollment, and will meet each Wednesday at 7:45 for five more weeks.

Fire Equipment Bond Issue Carried 42-7

The bond issue voted on at the special election held Oct. 9 to purchase fire fighting equipment for the Beaverton Rural Fire Protection District was carried by a vote of 42-for and 7-against.

Only 49 voters from a 43 square mile area voted.

Snell Clubs Forming

At a meeting held Friday afternoon Beaverton joined with many other Oregon cities in forming a "Snell for Governor Club." An intensive campaign was mapped out by the group to gather votes for the incumbent Governor, supported by his administration record.

To head the Beaverton group Leonard Adams was elected president; C. T. Hunkapillar, vice-president; Geo. Thyng, treasurer; I. R. Metzler, secretary; and J. J. McMahon, publicity.

"Snell for Governor Clubs" are voluntarily springing up in all sections of the state, Douglas McKay, general chairman of the state "Snell for Governor" organization, said today.

The need for this new equipment was graphically shown last Friday night when the J. A. Lincoln house on Sorrento Road was burned to the ground.

"Betsy" went to the fire when called and was doing a very good job of putting it out when the 580 gallon tank of water gave out and the firemen had to go back for a refill.

Her spirit was willing but her 1928 flesh was weak. She developed engine trouble and did not get back to the fire at all. So the house was burned down.

With the new equipment just voted in this would not happen. Two fire fighting units of the latest design and equipment will be purchased. One is to be a high pressure fog fighting unit capable of pumping 60 gallons per minute, with 800 pounds of pressure at the pumps. It carries a 400 gallon tank and a low pressure 250 gallon per minute pump as well.

The other unit is a standard low pressure pumper, with a 500 gallon tank, a 500 gallon pump and a 150 gallon booster pump.

This new equipment will lower all fire insurance rates in the entire district.

Also, when the new reservoir is installed, more hydrants will be put in and "refills" will be available at points other than in the towns.

Two East End Men Running For Contested Spots

Only two offices in Washington county are being contested — those of county coroner and county commissioner.

Henry R. Johnson of Route 2, Beaverton, republican, is running against E. J. Hess of Hillsboro, democrat, for the position of county commissioner. This position is being vacated by J. W. Hughes of Forest Grove.

Graham S. Young of Tigard, democrat, is opposing F. J. Sewell, incumbent, republican of Hillsboro, for county coroner.

Eastern Washington county is deserving of better representation on the county court than we have formerly had. Since Henry Johnson has been a resident and tax payer of this end of the county for many years he knows our problems and will have our interests at heart.

Graham S. Young of Tigard, running for county coroner, is also from the east end of the county. He is a young man up on his toes and a returned veteran.

Other incumbents running unopposed in the county are Mrs. Maud W. Boscow, republican, for county treasurer; H. B. Barrows, republican, for county surveyor, and H. T. Hesse of Scholls, republican and J. O. Johnson, of Tigard, republican, for county representative.

Columbia area council of Camp Fire which was composed of four units — Vancouver, Wash., Portland, Clackamas and Washington counties — has been dissolved and each unit has organized a separate unit council. Mrs. Philip VanArnam of Portland has been appointed as executive for Washington county, and assumed her duties this week, with offices in the auditorium of the library building, 212 North Second avenue, Hillsboro. Washington and Clackamas counties will share jointly in the services of the executive alternating weekly. Next week Mrs. VanArnam will be at Oregon City and the following week will return to this county.



Mrs. VanArnam is a graduate of University of Oregon school of nursing, studied at Mills college, Oakland, Cal., where she received her training in Camp Fire work; studied music at Willamette university; has done several years of professional nursing, including public health, also group work in youth organizations. She was chairman of production and volunteer services in Minidoka county, Idaho.

The reason for this change is to take Camp Fire to more girls, and the council thinks the growth will justify the change.

People of the entire county are contributors to the community chest, of which Camp Fire is a beneficiary, and all county girls are free to participate in this work.

GO TO THE POLLS

It is the privilege of every American citizen to be able to vote for the sort of government he wishes to live under. In many nations this is an unheard-of luxury or it is a fact in name only.

Voting is more than a privilege, it becomes the duty of the thinking public to see that the government and the men chosen to form this government are the best that can be found.

Choosing your government and its leaders is not a job you can afford to let "George" do. Yet, important as this is to the citizens of our country, there is a surprising number who do not use their voting privilege.

This was graphically illustrated in the vote just taken regarding the bond issue for adding to fire fighting equipment in the Beaverton Rural Fire Protection District.

There is almost no one thing you need more urgently than an adequate fire fighting unit at the time you need it. When your house or barn is burning your desire for protection is very acute. This, then, should have been of vital interest to all of the people living in the 43 square mile district served by this fire fighting equipment — but out of this area there were 49 votes cast.

Not a very good representation for 43 square miles! In Washington County there are 23,750 registered voters. Let's have 20,000 votes cast on November 5th.

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Sunset Highway Contract Let

The contract for eleven miles of paving and the building of four bridges on the North Plains-Barnes road section of the Sunset Highway was awarded to the Porter W. Yett Construction Co. at a low bid of \$729,472, according to the state highway commission.

It was also revealed that ultimate plans call for Jefferson and Columbia streets in Portland to be the city entrance to the Sunset highway with traffic separating at a circle to be built at the 18th avenue intersection.

The commission approved in-sauguration of one-way traffic on both streets, on Jefferson west to 14th avenue and on Columbia east from Canyon road to Front avenue.

All Citizens Should Vote On Charter

Attention of every Beaverton voter is again directed to the Charter Amendment which will appear on the Beaverton City Ballot next Tuesday, November 5.

The amendment simply authorizes in the Charter the same powers which are conferred upon municipalities by state law and which in the case of Beaverton have already been exercised under the present Charter as well as the one preceding it. The items are:

1. Taxing power. Obviously this essential function has been exercised annually in the adoption of a budget and the levying of taxes.
2. Issuing general obligation and revenue bonds or a combination of them. Our water bonds issued May 1, 1946, were combination revenue and general obligation bonds. To finance the needed sewer system and treatment plant the same or a similar type of bonds will be necessary.
3. Debt service or the retirement of bonds, and paying the interest thereon, to be outside the debt limitation. That has long since been the practice and will continue to be.

No additional powers not being exercised at present will be granted, and unless the amendment is adopted, the City will be unable to proceed with the sewer system.
