We pride ourselves on being humanitarians, and we permit fires that destroy more than 10,000 lives every year in the most horrible manner possible. One of our principal current problems is the shortage of building materials—and so we carelessly allow some \$600,000,000 worth of virtually irreplaceable property to go up in smoke in a twelvemonth. We talk about our clean, modern homes—and we litter them with debris that is the starting point of a large proportion of dwelling fires.
Here is inexorable prodigality. Rich as we may be, we can't afford that waste—and, financial values to one side, all the dollars on earth can't replace a single life. It is literally true that fire is more destructive than war—and fire is an enemy with whom we can sign no peace treaty, but we can lick him.
Every American must know the simple precautions that will prevent most fires—proper upkeep of heating and electrical equipment, care with smoking materials, periodic inspection of homes and other buildings to clear them of inflammable debris. We all know what we should do and it is up to us to proceed accordingly.


FSC Now Field Office
Farm Security's County office, Hillsboro, officially became a field office of the new farmers' home administration, consolidating FSA and emergency crop and seed loan programs, November 1. Simultaneously, Victor S. Madsen, county FSA supervisor, received notification he has been designated as interim FSA supervisor, pending completion of reorganization. Counties served by the office will continue to include Washington, Columbia, and Clatsop.
"Present FSA and emergency crop and seed loan borrowers will be effected very little if any by the consolidation except that these credit services will now be available from one office," said Madsen. "The new FSA created under Public Law 731 or the Cooley Bill is authorized to make annual crop and seed loans, longer-term supervised operating goods loans, 40 year farm ownership loans, small water facility and group service loans."
All FSA and emergency crop loan accounts will be consolidated in the FSA office as soon as possible.

There are many soil poisons, Dr. Schmitt asserted. The easiest one to use, he said, is ortho-dichlorobenzene. "You dig a shallow trench along your foundation wall and pour in ortho-dichlorobenzene at the rate of two gallons to ten linear feet," Dr. Schmitt explained. "With an earth-filled porch, the best thing to do is dig up the porch along the foundation."

Cure Found For Termites
SCHENECTADY — Sprays, fumigants, or paints will not kill wood termites that are attacking house timbers, but using a soil poison to cut off the mud gallery from the house will do the job.
So stated Dr. John B. Schmitt, assistant professor of entomology at Rutgers university, New Brunswick, New Jersey, in a General Electric Farm Forum address here over station WGY.
"The real answer is in the soil," said Dr. Schmitt, who also is a staff member of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment station. "The key to the whole thing is the termite's need for soil moisture; it must be able to go back and forth between the soil and the wood. Cut it off from either one, and it dies. Sometimes a small structural change will do the trick, but more often you need a soil poison."
