## City Service Positions Open to Men and Women

Announcement of examinations for four classes of positions in the city service were made by the Municipal Civil Service Board in Portland last Tuesday. Open to both men and women are three classes of clerical positions—clerk, typist clerk, and stenographer clerk, and open to women only is an examination for Policewoman.

The requirements for each of the clerical examinations include high school graduation, or the permissible substitution of one year of clerical experience or six months of business college for each of the last two years of high school. The last day for filing applications for the clerical tests is January 4, the examinations to be held Saturday, January 11. The present monthly salaries for three clerical classes range from \$142 to \$177.

Applicants for the clerical positions must be registered voters (if of age) and must reside within the area covered by Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington counties. Candidates who are naturalized citizens must show citizenship papers, and veterans who are entitled to veteran's credit must show honorable discharges.

The examination for Policewoman is open only to women with college training in sociology, psychology, or education and will be held January 14. The positions, with a monthly salary range from \$202 to \$232, involve specialized police and case work in the apprehension of violators and the prevention of crime against or involving women and children. The last day for filing applications for the Policewoman examination is January 11.

When applying, all candidates for this examination must provide proof of age (21-50) foreign-born candidates must present naturalization papers, and veterans must present discharge papers.

For honorably discharged veterans an additional 10 per cent of the final earned rating will be added to the examination scores.

Application blanks are available at Room D, Municipal Auditorium (entrance SW 3rd and Clay Streets, Telephone AT 6141) between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. weekdays and 8:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. Saturdays.

## Entrance Exams Open Next Class Cadet Midshipmen

Entrance examinations for appointment in the next class of cadet-midshipmen of the U. S. Merchant Marine Cadet Corps and its Academy at King's Point, N. Y., will be held on April 4, 1947. It was announced by Commander E. G. McDonald, USMS, District Supervisor, 1000 Geary Street, San Francisco, Cal.

Excellent opportunity to obtain, at no cost, a combined technical training and college education leading to a career as ship's officer, at sea and after sea experience, positions in the shipping industry and its allied activities are offered to qualified candidates. Cadet-Midshipmen receive at least \$65 monthly pay and quarters and subsistence besides a free college course.

High school seniors 16½ to 21 years of age scheduled to graduate in May or June, 1947 may apply. To enable them to complete high school and receive diplomas, successful candidates will not be assigned until July 1947.

Academy graduates qualify for commissions as Ensign, U. S. Maritime Service, and Ensign, U. S. Naval Reserve as well as licenses as ship's officers in the deck or engine department.

Commander McDonald urges interested candidates to apply early as many applicants failed to qualify for the last entrance examination because applications arrived too late to be properly reviewed.
