S. P. Asks For Bids On Freight Cars

More than doubling its already
heavy post war purchasing of
new, modern freight cars, South-
ern Pacific is asking for bids on
6,200 box, auto, flat, hopper and
gondola cars, according to infor-
mation received by F. C. Nelson,
freight traffic manager, Portland,
from A. T. Mercier, president.

The coming purchases will sup-
plement 5,000 new freight cars al-
ready purchased, of which 4,000
were delivered during the past
year.

In addition to purchase of new
freight cars for its own owner-
ship, Southern Pacific is partici-
pating in orders already placed
for 5,000 new refrigerator cars for
Pacific Fruit Express Company,
jointly owned by Southern Pacific
and Union Pacific. These are to
be delivered before the end of the
year.

Also now on order for Southern
Pacific are 20 heavy duty diesel-
electric freight locomotives to be
delivered before year's end and 23
additional engines to be deliv-
ered early this year for Southern
Pacific's already large fleet of
diesel-electric switchers.

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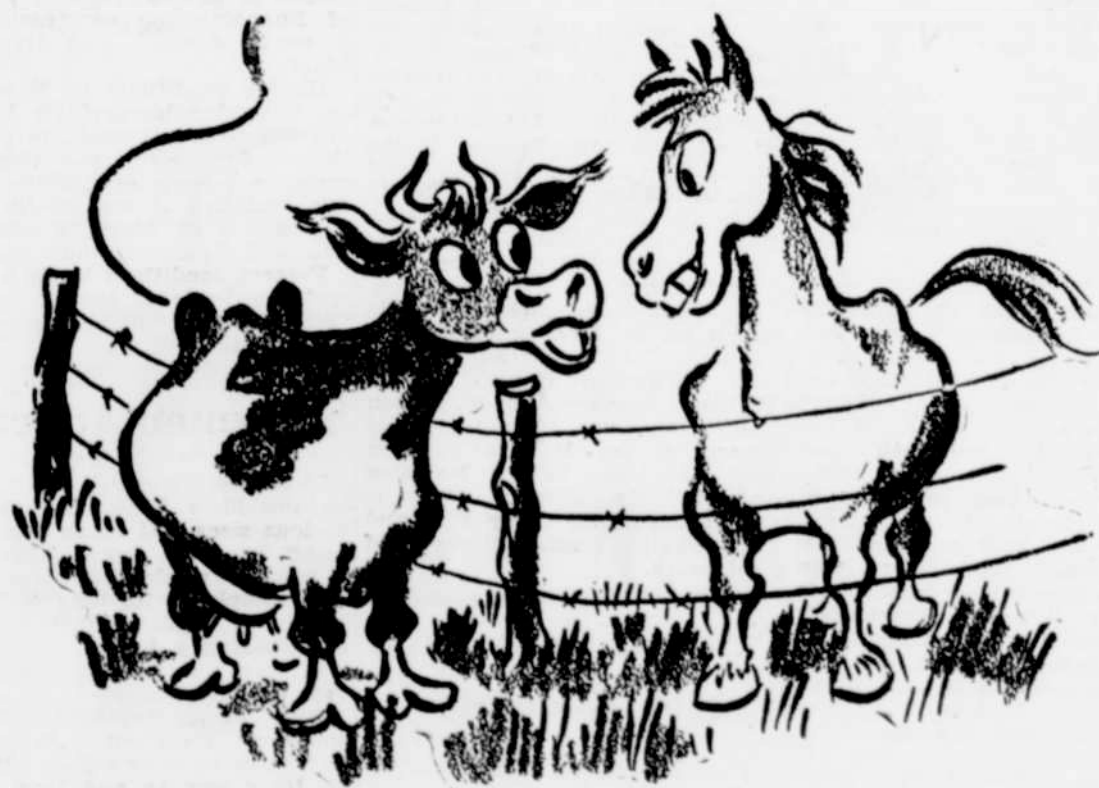
