Another Mile Post

The balance of the fund will be set aside to purchase annuities for those who are now in active service.



State Capitol—Salem, Oregon, January 23rd, 1947: As the Legislature gets well into its second week, the real work of the session begins to take form and work it will be made no mistake about that. It seems to be clear to all lawmakers, especially those who are members of the Joint Committee on Ways and Means (which committee raises the money for your state), that they will have to find ways and means to gather in a minimum of 10 million dollars additional for the next biennium. From the conversations and discussions overheard from scores of legislators, it seems that they can't agree with the Governor on tax matters. Especially so when it comes to the budget submitted by the Governor, which is supposed to balance, if money is taken out of one pocket and put in the other.

A considerable number of the lawmakers are of the firm opinion that the budget cannot be balanced if the necessary additional needs of the state are to be met, without first raising many millions more, and that's that.

Some day the people of Oregon will wake up to the fact, said one senator, "that the one and only proper answer to the continual tax mess that Oregon always finds itself in, is a sales tax. True, many people don't like such a tax. In fact few people like any tax at all. But the only thing we humans are sure of in this life is death and taxes, so we might just as well get used to it."

Our neighboring states to the north and south have had a sales tax for years and it has all but solved their tax question. The big trouble with our tax program and the state income tax, is that altogether too many people duck it and it seems to be there is no way to get them. With a sales tax, it gets everyone. There is no out, such as happened to Oregon during the lush war years when upwards of 200,000 transient people came to Oregon to work in our many war industries and earned all the way from \$60 to \$100 per week. These people received all the benefits of our state, such as free schooling for their children, unemployment compensation, benefits, police and fire protection, recreational facilities and etc. And as to be expected, few of these people paid any tax at all. A sales tax would have reached every last one of them. Hence, many millions of dollars in justifiable taxes were lost to the state and will continue to be lost until the people of Oregon wake up!

This legislature will again introduce a sales tax bill and if it gets through both houses, the bill in turn will be submitted to the people for approval or rejection at the next regular election. A flock of other tax bills, emanating from the Oregon Tax Study Commission, were introduced in the House last Monday, but only time will tell how far they will get.

And the Governor denies (at this time) that he intends being a candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. Senator, come May, 1948. Oh yeah! Just put it down in your book that he will be a candidate and that is our prediction for sure. If he makes the nomination, and he will, because Senator Cordon will retire, the Governor can then resign some time in the early fall of 1948 and President of the Senate, Marshall Cornett will become Governor. It will be good politics for the Governor as a candidate, to step out two or three months prior to the general election in November, 1948, otherwise Secretary of State Bob Farrell would become Governor if Snell don't resign until AFTER the election in November. Get the point?

Vets' Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper will publish a weekly column of questions most frequently asked concerning the Veterans Administration in this area. For more detailed information, veterans are to contact or write to the nearest V A contact unit at 1019 S. W. 10th Ave., Portland.

Q. Can I pay my National Service Life Insurance premiums at the Veterans Administration contact office?

A. No. Contact offices are not authorized to accept remittances for insurance premiums. Payments may be made in person at the regional office in your state or mailed to:

Q. I was captured by the enemy during World War II and was in a prisoner of war camp for 15 months but my claim for disability was denied by the Veterans Administration. What can I do now that the disability is getting worse?

A. The Veterans Administration will give special consideration to disability claims filed by veterans interned in enemy prison camps. You should get in touch with your nearest V A office and have your case reopened.

Q. May I transfer part of my eligibility for education and training to my wife who is also a veteran but who does not have sufficient entitlement to complete her college course?

A. No. A wife, even though a veteran, cannot use any part of her husband's entitlement under the G. I. Bill provisions.

Q. Am I entitled to field trip expenses in gathering material for a thesis while I am in school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. Veterans Administration will not pay for occasional field trips, whether to a summer camp, or for data for research or thesis, where the charge to the student is a separate charge not included in the tuition or laboratory fee customarily paid by all students enrolled in the course.

Q. How may application be made for domiciliary or hospital care of a veteran?

A. Veterans Administration Form P-10 "Application for Hospital Treatment or Domiciliary Care," should be executed by the veteran or nearest relative, guardian or representative, and forwarded to the nearest V A hospital, regional office, or contact office. If found to be eligible for admission, the veteran will be promptly notified and if admission cannot be authorized, the veteran will be informed and the reason stated.

Q. Must property, to secure a guaranteed loan, be covered by insurance?

A. It is customary for lenders to require insurance on buildings against which loans are made in order to protect themselves against loss of security. This also protects the veteran since it may provide funds to replace the loss. Buildings used as security for loans which carry the guaranty of the V A must be insured against fire and other hazards against which it is customary to insure in the community.

Dairy Manufacturers Set Annual Convention Plans

A "bigger and better" combined convention and short course is planned for members and friends of the Oregon Dairy Manufacturers' association, says President Ed L. Reeser, Albany, concerning the thirty-sixth annual convention to be held February 18, 19 and 20 at Oregon State college.

The principal speaker on the 3 day program will be Percy Reed, dairy commissioner, province of Saskatchewan, Canada. In addition to the educational talks on the program there will be the dairy products show, judging contests, a smoker, the annual banquet and other features.

Last year 250 registered for the convention, with 350 at the banquet. This year an even larger turn-out is expected, according to committee members working on arrangements.

By the end of 1946, 19,559 Pacific Northwest veterans had received guaranteed loans totaling \$86,355,718.

Approximately 3,000 veterans were patients in Veterans Administration hospitals in the Pacific Northwest at the end of 1946.
