Ross Stresses Importance of Farm Union Maintaining Constructive-Aggressive Policy in Agriculture

At a well attended meeting in Hillsboro on the evening of January 24, Lyman Ross, vice-president of Laurel-Scholls Local, who were hosts for the occasion, was installed as the new President of the Washington County Farmers Union.

Other officers installed were G. E. Beaman, Vice-President; Noble Scheerer, Gatekeeper; M. J. Vanderzanden, Conductor and Chester Wohler, Frank Schulmerich and John Plass, Executive Board.

Albert Kemmer of Beaverton, gave a detailed report on the recent hearing conducted by the Public Utilities Commissioner on

the Petition of the West Coast Telephone Company for an increase in rates. Mr. Kemmer concluded that the company, in his opinion, was receiving sufficient revenue under present rates to pay all operating costs and to carry on an adequate construction program to meet the requirements of the territory served and to pay a reasonable return on the investment and that the request for an increase in rates is not justified.

A committee of the Washington County Farmers Union has taken an active part in opposition to the petition of the Telephone Company for increased rates and on the basis of facts brought out in the hearings presented a resolution calling for a complete investigation of the company by the present Legislature, and enactment of legislation to correct the abuses suffered by the public with the sanction of the Public Utilities Commissioner in the case of certain utility companies. The Resolution was unanimously adopted and the President and committee instructed to take whatever action necessary.

Other action taken was the approval of a resolution received from the Laurel-Scholls Local opposing any increase in salaries of elected State officials and appointive department heads by the present Legislature. Disapproval of HB 88 known as the County Zoning and Planning Bill, and the so-called "Freeway Bill" was officially recorded. The Legislative Committee was instructed to meet at least once each week while the Legislature is in session to study all Bills effecting agriculture and to take what action necessary.

Mr. Ross, in his acceptance remarks, called for the continued and active interest of farmers in all social and economic legislation as well as that which effects specific farm problems. He stressed the importance of the Farm Union maintaining a constructive and aggressive policy in behalf of agriculture and the advisability of working harmoniously with other responsible groups and organizations for securing the most equitable distribution of the abundance of our country. He asked for active agriculture and legislative committees in each local with a full program and discussion of timely topics at each meeting and pledged his efforts in this direction as President of the organization in the County.

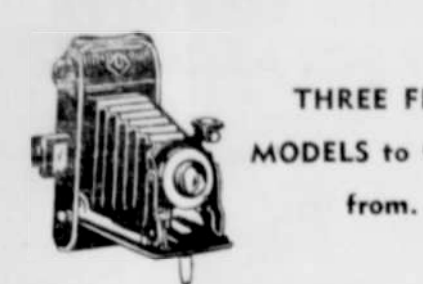
