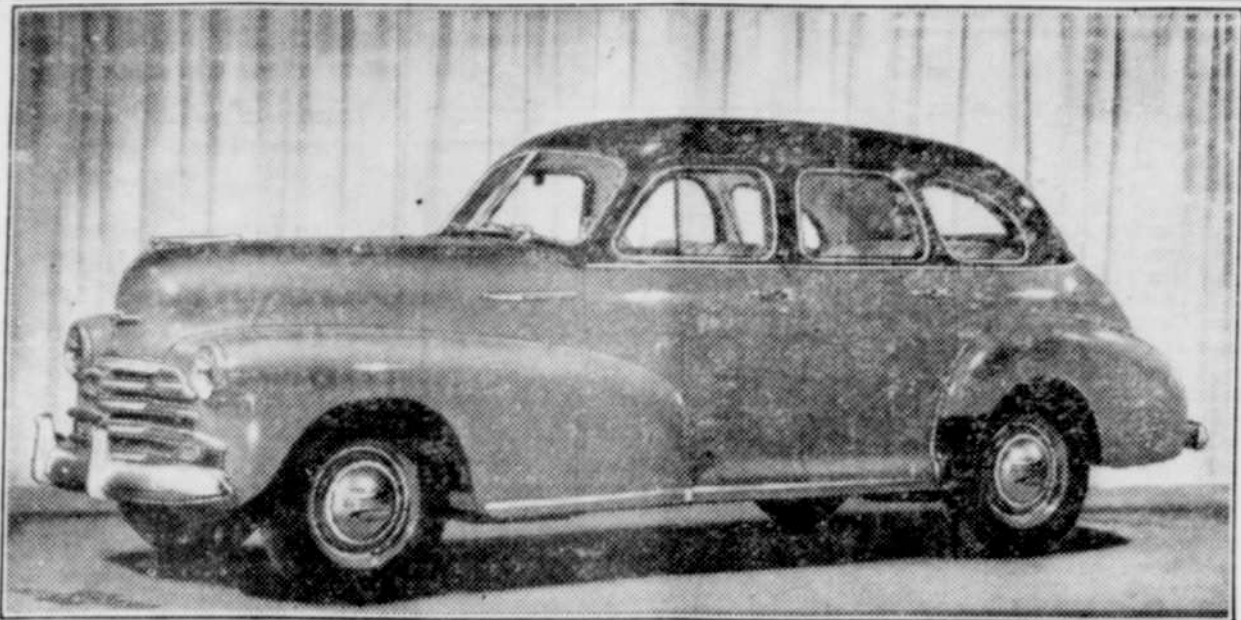


Smart Lines Characterize New Chevrolet

State House — Salem, Oregon, February 6th, 1947. A deluge of bills hit the House hopper today, the 25th day of the Session and the deadline for the promiscuous introduction of new bills. From now on until final adjournment, any of the lawmakers who have a yen to draft a new House bill, will have to arrange for said bill to be introduced by the House Committee on Legislation and Rules. And, incidentally, this Committee is a tough customer to deal with when it comes to admitting any bills from now on out. So naturally those lawmakers who had any legislation in mind arranged to have their pet bills reach the House today. Over in the Senate, practically the same rule applies, only the toga men have 35 days in which to drop in new legislation. So look forward to seeing a whole flock of bills hit the Senate desk on or before February 17th, which is their deadline.

The big truck bill, which like the trapeze performer, "sailed through the House with the greatest of ease" — only three votes against it — had most everyone fooled. Such legislation in sessions past, was always the signal for a real battle between the railroads and the truckers. This "doneybrook" would go on for weeks with the railroads always winding up on the winning side. But time changes many things and the big truck bill proved it.

When the State Capitol was constructed some ten years ago, the architectural plans called for two large rooms to be set aside—one at each end of the Capitol as a place for the members of both House and Senate to gather in privacy in order to discuss pending legislation and transact other business of the legislature. The rooms have never been furnished or made available to the lawmakers until this session when a Resolution was adopted appropriating the tremendous sum of \$4000 or thereabout, to furnish same and then the tempest and furor started. "Nothing more or less than a night club for the legislators," screamed some of the newspapers and a couple of the very saintly members of the House took the floor to denounce the "wild expenditure and utter disregard of taxpayers money for such a thing as a meeting room for legislators decked out with red and green furniture." Incidentally, such speeches always sound good to the rank and file and are almost a sure bet to gather votes come the next election. So the lounge

deal is out, and the legislators who have no place but their desks for work, can meet with the squirts out on the State House lawn to discuss taxes, legislation and other pending business of the session.
