Mrs. Little is discussing with parents "How Your Children Would Like You to Be."

Mrs. Little will conduct county wide meetings on "Parent-Adolescent Relationships" in Umatilla, Coos and Jackson counties during February.

Parents need good humor and patience, as well as love, to help adolescent children, Mrs. Little says. The most important tasks an adolescent has to do is to grow up in relation to the opposite sex and establish himself as an independent individual. To parents is given the privilege of guiding him in reaching his goals. The adolescent wishes to understand and have a part in keeping the family budget, she continues. He would like to have his parents practice democracy in his home based on differences of personality.

"Understanding Yourself and Others" is the mental hygiene discussion Mrs. Little conducted in Morrow county recently. Life never runs on an even keel for long periods of time, she explains. The moods of a person tend to follow his achievements. When he has done well, he feels elated, but when he fails he feels "down". This is normal and wholesome. But when one turns his attention too much toward his own feelings and moods, then there is danger.
