We were coming home last Saturday at 2:15 a.m. after spending the evening in Portland. Coming west in West Slope I first noticed a rosy pink fuchsia glow to the north then it looked like search lights shooting skywards.

I said to my husband, "Look at the lovely glow in the sky. I wonder what it is." He said, "Probably another fire on Bonny Slope." I said, "That isn't a fire glow, a fire glow is orange colored. Look at those beams shooting out. Park! I want to see this." I have never seen the Northern Lights. But I know that is what this is. It is too beautiful to miss and so mystifying.

We parked near the railroad in Beaverton and watched the glow. It opened up very much like a fan. The beams of light looked very much like search lights shooting up through a fog. I loved watching it. We finally decided it was fading out, so we started on home and the battery wouldn't start the car.

So we watched the Aurora Borealis some more and tried to flag two motorists to give us a shove but they don't flag at that time in the morning (And I don't blame them.) But after several minutes we finally got started. (We have since bought a new battery.)

I was told, "Me an my Northern Lights", we're you feel silly if it is just some barges or something burning?"

But it really was the true Aurora Borealis, very seldom seen this far south. Though they were seen at Bend and a few more places in Oregon besides Beaverton and Aloha.
