Save a Life Check Your Car

Oregon's record traffic flow is expected to reach flood stage in May, it has been revealed by Robert S. Farrell Jr. The average may top 15,000,000 miles a day from May through August.

"The biggest part of the increase will probably come on the main highways," Farrell said. "Inter-city travel is always at the top during vacation months."

He placed great emphasis on the danger of too much speed on the crowded highways. The latest 1947 summary showed four out of 5 deaths taking place in rural locations, mostly on main arteries. This trend has been growing markedly over a period of years.

"No sensible person will ignore four-to-one odds," Farrell said. "City driving may seem more nerve wracking, but the real danger rides the open road. Death certificates don't lie."

People expecting to drive on their vacations are being asked to check their cars over carefully. The most recent wide-scale inspection showed probably 100,000 faulty cars operating in this state. Brakes and lights topped the hazard list.

In the glider course, several special Glider flights were made to orient him on Glider warfare.

This latest type of training produces combined qualified jumpers and glidermen and also involves specialized training in Communications, Rigger and Parachute Maintenance, which are all vital skills in any Airborne unit.
