

Veterans Administration Warns Against Unapproved Schools In The G. I. Training Program

The Veterans Administration has issued a warning to veterans against signing contracts for educational courses which may not be approved.

Answering complaints from veterans who have been urged to sign contracts for instruction and to make a down payment with the understanding that they would be

reimbursed by the VA, John W. Corris, Northwest director of the VA's education service, cautioned veterans that they should check with the VA prior to signing such agreements. Corris pointed out that the VA cannot pay a school or other institution for a veteran's training unless the institution is approved by the state in which it operates.

Question of the Week

Q. Will my ten per cent World War II disability payment be increased if I marry?
A. No. Your compensation is based on the degree of your disability, not on the number of dependents.

Benefits To World War II Veterans and Their Dependents Education and Training

Description: Education or on-the-job training for a period of one calendar year plus the time in active service on or after September 16, 1940, and before the termination of the war. Total period not to exceed 48 months. VA pays tuition, fees, necessary book and supply costs up to \$500 for an ordinary school year. Student also receives a monthly subsistence allowance of \$65 (if without dependents) or \$90 (with dependents) with the allowance reduced if allowance and income from productive labor exceed \$175 a month (without dependents) or \$200 (with dependents).

Requirements: Active service, part or all of it on or after September 16, 1940, and before the end of the war. At least 90 days service with discharge other than dishonorable, or less than 90 days if discharge was for service-incurred liability.

Time Limit: Education or training courses must be started within 4 years after date of discharge or termination of war, whichever is later, and must be completed within 9 years after the termination of war.

G. I. INSURANCE

In previous articles we discussed the permanent forms of National Service Life Insurance. Some misunderstanding on the method by which term insurance may be converted to these forms will be clarified in this article.

In the first place, a term insurance policy (the kind you had in service) may be converted to a permanent plan either as of the current month, or as of the original date of issue or any premium due date between the original and current date. If you convert back to the original date of issue, the monthly premiums would be slightly lower than the current age premiums, but you would have to deposit a sum large enough to equal the reserve of the policy. In other words, if you had carried a 20-payment life policy three years, it would have a certain cash value today. If at this time, you convert a term policy to a 20-pay life three years old, you would have to provide a sum equal to 3 years reserve to bring such a policy up to date. This plan is not often recommended because at "young ages" the rate per year on any type of policy increases very slowly.

A better plan is to convert your term insurance as of your present age, and if you have excess funds, such as a terminal leave bond you may pay the premiums in advance and obtain a three per cent discount. In event of your death, any premiums on deposit beyond the current month are refunded in addition to the payment of the amount of insurance involved.

Veterans should not be in too big a hurry to convert, but should wait until they know where they stand financially. In many cases it is better to convert a part at the time, continuing the balance as term insurance until it also can be converted to a permanent policy.

HEALTH FOR ALL Preventing Disease

Most parents, even those who neglect their own health, are conscientious where their children's welfare is concerned. They try to provide the proper food, housing and medical care and to teach their children hygienic habits.

As children enter adolescence and begin to meet a larger group of people and acquire new interests, parental supervision of health habits may begin to relax. Engrossed by their new interests, hobbies and friendships and unable to judge the limits of their own endurance, young people are apt to "overdo it," undermining health so carefully guarded in childhood.

Actually, adolescence is a period when observance of health rules is as important as ever. One of the major dangers to young people who allow their general health to deteriorate is tuberculosis. Despite the fact that the human body has a natural resistance to tuberculosis, this disease takes the lives of more young people between the ages of 15 and 35 than any other disease. This is true in a country which takes great pride in the advantages and opportunities offered young men and women.

A person who contracts TB must spend months or years in a sanatorium or sick room — months or years that should be spent launching or furthering his career. The eradication of tuberculosis would constitute a major gain to the country as a whole.

Young people are not the only group susceptible to TB. No age group is immune. Parents, however, can help eradicate tuberculosis by teaching young people to keep their general health at top level and to form the habit of getting periodic physical examinations, including chest X-rays. If a person who has formed the habit of having periodic chest X-rays gets tuberculosis, he discovers the disease in its early stages, when the chances of arresting it are best.

If all cases of tuberculosis were found in the early stages, the chain of communication could be broken and the disease which is the greatest threat to America's young people could in time be eradicated.

"When you go into a doctor's office," sez Pa Trolman, "You oh and you ah, and when you come out, you only owe. How much you owe depends on who you ah."
