Filbert Nutcracker In Production

The Abbott Filbert Grading and Cracking Machine is now in limited production. It is constructed for use by individual orchardists and is a product of the Rosborough-Walsh Co., 0207 S. W. Hamilton, Portland, Ore.

Breakage Avoided

As explained by the firm, the grader and cracker does just that—in one operation, handling field run filberts without breaking or crushing the nut meats. Varying tension on a series of cracking hammers applies exactly the right amount of cracking power per size of nut.

Designed for the use of orchardists, the cracking machine is easy to operate and economical to use. One man can crack up to 300 pounds of filberts per hour, and it is readily portable. Optional equipment includes a blower for separating shell fragments from nut meats.

Construction features include a cast aluminum base, steel shafts, hopper and grader, bronze connecting rods and bushings, and the power unit is a 1-4 horsepower electric motor.

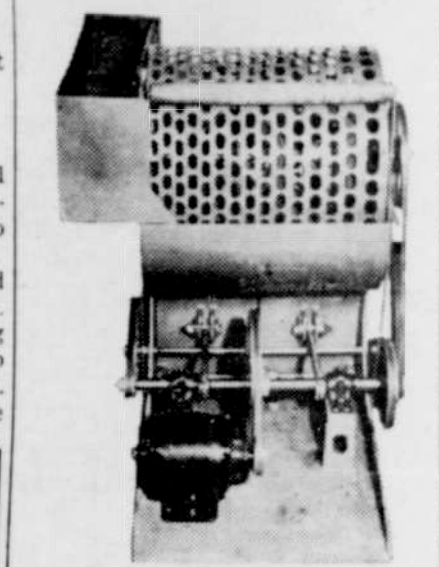

New roles for summer fruits and vegetables

Summer fruits and vegetables deserve an A—for appetite appeal—when seasoned and served in temptingly different ways. So get out the lemon, paprika, mint and cheese and try these.

MINTED PEAS—Green peas and cool mint blend to make a dish as refreshing as the evening breeze after a hot day. Crush 6 fresh mint leaves and add to 1/2 cup cream or top milk. Let stand. Shell 2 pounds peas and cook, covered, in small amount of boiling water until tender, about 10 minutes. Strain mint from cream; heat and pour over peas just before serving. Season with salt, pepper and butter. Serves 6.

FRUIT KABOB—Food drinks are doubly delightful with these cute "dunkers." On a cellophane or other sturdy straw, string a fat red strawberry, a melon ball or cube, and a chunk of banana or pineapple.



ROASTING EARS AU GRATIN—Golden yellow corn wears a jacket of cheese. Be sure to make a nonstop trip from oven to table. Cook husked, cleaned roasting ears in boiling, salted water to cover in a covered kettle until tender, 5 to 10 minutes. Remove from water; brush with melted butter and roll in grated American cheese. Place in flat baking pan in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 5 minutes or until cheese melts.
