

Get Out and Vote

An election at which the voters of the Beaverton Union High School District No. 10, expected to arrive in the district on Wednesday, but which was postponed to Tuesday, August 5, will be held Tuesday, August 5 from 2 p. m. to 7 p. m. at the Beaverton High School building.

At a recent election the Garden Home voters chose, with a vote of three to one, to be included into the Beaverton high district.

This will increase enrollment in Beaverton High School by an estimated 15 to 20, which will not increase overhead costs. However, it will increase the assessed valuation of the area and so reduce taxes per capita. Last year the Garden Home valuation was \$350,041.41. This year it is estimated it will reach the half million mark.

If this new area is taken into No. 10, the present obligations of the Beaverton High School District No. 10 will be spread over the entire area.

peel). Use coarse blade of

food chopper. Add pineapple and

sugar. Stir well. Heat to boiling

Cook 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour into hot, sterilized

A V C Carnival August 1

Preparations for the second annual carnival of the American Veterans Committee next Friday and Saturday nights, August 1 and 2 at the Portland Armory are well under way according to Fred Rosenbaum, AVC Recreation Director.

This carnival will offer the public the year's best evening's entertainment. Freddie Keller's band has been engaged for both Friday and Saturday nights. Rosenbaum pointed out that donated prizes and volunteer help enable AVC to offer the public free admission and free dancing, refreshments at very low prices, and numerous carnival games.

Proceeds from the carnival will contribute substantially to sustain AVC's downtown offices and AVC's Veterans' Service Program, which assists all veterans, members as well as others, in presenting claims in accordance with the rules of the Veterans' Administration, and also tries to help veterans to solve their housing and employment problems and aid in their rehabilitation.

\$275,000 Washington Co. Share Basic School Fund

The preliminary report for the distribution of the new Basic School Support Fund shows that Washington County will receive approximately \$725,000 for 1947-48. This amount is \$300,000 more than the totals of the State School Support Fund (\$330,000) and the Elementary Fund (\$95,000) which are now a part of the Basic School Fund.

The new Basic School Support is apportioned on the basis of pupil days' membership, teachers employed, an equalization fund based on need, and transportation. On a state-wide basis it amounts to approximately \$50 per census child or \$16,000,000. Districts will receive one-half in September and one-half in March.

Bean Pickers to Get 2½c Per Lb.

The minimum rate for picking beans for the entire state has been set at 2½ cents plus a 1-4c bonus making a total of 2½c a pound for those who work through the entire season reports Roy L. Davidson, Farm Labor Assistant. All growers in Washington county so far contacted seem pretty well agreed on paying this scale, and reports from other sections in the state seems to indicate that the 2½c rate will prevail. An occasional field may present unusual conditions such as weeds, poor crop, or other handicaps to the picker which will justify a higher wage scale. The common practice of growers with such fields is to check earnings of workers in neighboring bean yards and adjust their own picking rate so that their pickers can earn wages comparable to the workers in other yards. A number will start operations this week with light returns as the beans have not matured sufficiently for heavy returns at that time.

At present all growers appear to have sufficient help signed up for their harvest operations, although it is expected that more workers will be needed as the peak of the season approaches. The farm labor office has a surplus of bean pickers at present, and any grower needing help should contact the office.

Haying and caneberry harvest are completed and the peach harvest will be next in order with hop picking slated to begin not later than August 15.

Picking of the canning varieties of peaches is expected to begin this week. The office has some orders for men to pick peaches. However, no one from outside of the county should come to Hillsboro without first phoning the office, Hillsboro 2171.

The Basic School Fund was voted by the people last November and at the present time comes from income tax revenues. Whenever income tax receipts fall short the levy will go on property. If the people approved the sales tax measure as now proposed the levy would not need to revert to a property tax, provided revenue from the income tax dropped to a low level.

Although more money is available for schools there will not be a noticeable decrease in tax levies due to rising prices. Districts which are not making excessive levies for equipment, added personnel, and buildings will find tax levies about equal to last year and in many instances lowered.
