

Keep Eggs Cool

Now that we have had a few hot days, poultrymen are paying more attention to keeping their eggs cool.

In Yamhill county, Morie Shepard of Route 1, Carlton, recently told Assistant County Agent Norton Taylor, "My humidified egg cooling and storage room makes me at least \$1 a case on

my egg production, during hot summer weather." He says that 75 per cent of his egg production grades AA quality as a result of using egg cooling and storage facilities.

Humidified egg cooling and storage rooms should be equipped to keep eggs at a temperature of from 40 to 65 degrees and should have a relative humidity above 85 per cent.

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County Fair To Include Horseshow

One of the drawing cards for the Washington County Fair to be held in Hillsboro, at Shute Park Aug. 27 to Sept. 7, will be the Western horseshow slated for Saturday afternoon, Aug. 30, about 50 mounted riders are expected to enter, according to Mrs. Guy Paine, of Orenco, member in charge.

Eight closed events, four open events and a drill by the Washington County Sheriff's posse have been scheduled to test the skill of riders and horses in the fast-moving show.

The Washington County Westerners and Forest Grove Ranch Riders, sponsors of the show, have sent invitations to seven riding organizations to enter the event. Mrs. Paine said. A purse of \$10 per race plus entry fee of 50 cents per person will be charged.

Open entries in the show include the walk, trot and get, the trial race, musical barrels in pair (man and woman), and a Washington County Fair Specialty which promises to be the feature attraction of the day.

Closed entries are: Barrel race (team of six), ladies package race in pairs, surf board, and shuttle relay.

Invitations to enter the meet have been extended the Washington County Sheriff's posse, Sheridan Saddle club, Sheridan Canter club, Grande Ronde Saddle club, Trail Riders of Grande Ronde, Beaverton Saddle club and fair board is assisting in the show.

Seven events have been scheduled for the Junior Western Show to be held Friday afternoon, with a cash prize to be awarded every child who rides in the grand entry. All children 16 years of age and under are eligible to enter. No entry fee will be charged.

Children will compete in a musical barrel event, boot race, single Scurry, barrel race, walk trot and get, package race and shuttle relay. Both horse shows will take place on the old hall park north of the fair grounds. All entries should be sent to W. F. Ralston, 310 W. Pacific, Forest Grove. County Agent Tells How to Can Peaches

Oregon's abundant peach crop provides homemakers a chance to catch up on canning or freezing their winter fruit supply, offsetting shortages of cherries and prunes.

Plenty of peaches of good quality now are available in local stores says Beryl Scothorn, assistant Home Demonstration Agent. And she adds that the end of sugar rationing makes preserving fruit an easier job than it was during the war years.

The extension service recommends that peaches be canned by the hot water bath method. Detailed directions are as follows:

Select firm, ripe peaches. Immerse in boiling water 1 minute or until skins slip easily. Plunge into cold water for a few seconds, peel, cut into halves, and remove pits. To prevent the fruit from turning dark, wash the halves in a weak salt solution using 1 level tablespoon of non-iodized salt and 1 1/2 tablespoons of white vinegar in 3 quarts of cold water. Rinse in cold water after washing in this solution.

Simmer the fruit from 4 to 8 minutes in medium syrup (1 cup sugar to 2 cups water). Pack halves in jars or cans with pitted sides down in overlapping layers, add boiling syrup to 1/2 inch from top of jar or 1-4 inch from top of tin. Place jars in hot water bath and process for 15 minutes, counting processing time from the time water starts boiling. Water bath should cover jars to a depth of one inch.

If preferred, fruit can be packed in jars cold, covered with syrup, then placed in water bath and processed for 30 minutes. Because the fruit will shrink somewhat in processing, jars are less well filled when this method is used.

To add flavor to the syrup, some homemakers add 1 cracked pit to each quart, boil for 2 minutes, then strain out the pieces.

If sweeter syrup is desired, use a 40 per cent solution. This requires 9 cups sugar and 13 1/2 cups water for one dozen quart jars.

One bushel of peaches will can about 24 quarts. One flat (14 to 18 pounds) will can 6 to 8 quarts. One lug (24 to 28 pounds) will can 8 to 12 quarts.

Peaches also make good jams, preserves, and sweet pickles. Recipes are available at the home demonstration agent's office in Hillsboro.

Avoiding Vacation Accidents

Summertime makes us think of swimming, hiking, fishing and camping—all adventures which take us into the outdoors and away from the well-established patterns of life at home. A vacation should be a happy, carefree time that "recreates" us for the winter months ahead.

But many a long-planned vacation has been spoiled by a careless accident. When accidents do happen, it is essential to know and apply the appropriate "first aid" measures. Many boys and girls learn first aid measures in connection with their Scouting activities. Their parents would do well to imitate them, especially when planning a vacation away from home and the family doctor.

Some of the more common vacation accidents include swimming accidents, cuts, burns and bites. Swimming is an essential part of most vacations. Most swimming accidents can be avoided if a few safety rules are practiced.

Cramps cause many swimming accidents and swimming too soon after eating is apt to cause stomach cramps. It is a safety measure to stay out of the water for two hours after eating. No one, not even an expert swimmer, should go swimming alone, as accidents can happen to anyone. No one should stay in the water for a long period, especially so long as to become chilled or tired. And no one should dive into unfamiliar waters. A pond that was safe last year may have changed during the winter. At least one person in a camping group should be trained in life-saving methods and in artificial respiration.

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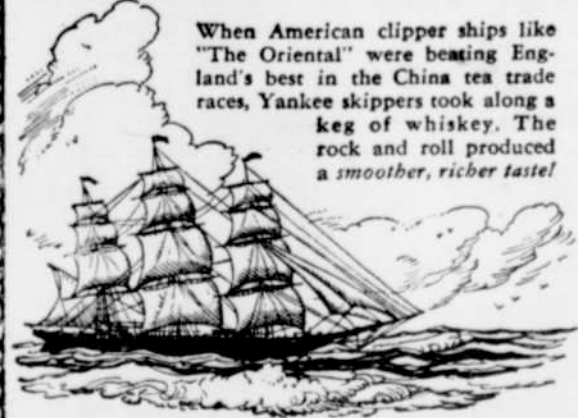
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
