Barnes School Has 57 Enrollment

Barnes School opened Sept. 8 with 57 students in all eight grades. These are divided as follows: first, 7; second, 11; third, 9. These students are taught by Mrs. Ruby Abbott. Mr. James E. Beaverton Grade Has Too Many Pupils For Rooms

The Beaverton Grade School which opened Monday, Sept. 8, is facing the crisis they were afraid would arise, that of having too many pupils and no classrooms to expand into. Enrollment so far is 526 which is 44 more than last year. Approximate present enrollment by grades is as follows: First, 64; second, 80; third, 72; fourth, 72; fifth, 73; sixth, 56; seventh, 60; and eighth, 46. Last year there were 3 first and 3 second grades and 2 of each of the other grades. These 22 rooms filled all available space. Present enrollment seems to indicate the adding of another third, fourth and fifth grades, but the question is where will they put them?
