## WASHINGTON COUNTY TEAM SECOND

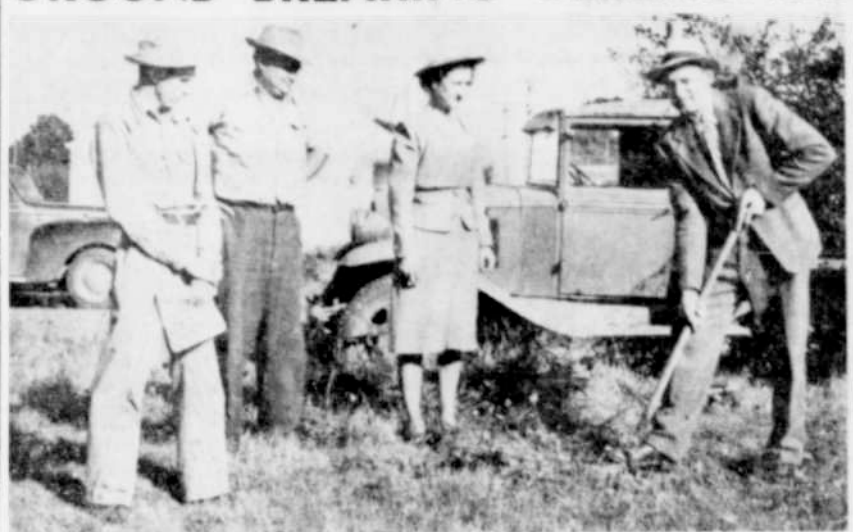
The Washington County 4-H Club team of poultry judges won second place at the Oregon State Fair at Salem.

## New Gas Main Increases Supply In Valley Area

Increasing demands for gas in the Washington county area have resulted in Portland Gas & Coke company this week signing a contract for the construction of ten miles of six-inch main, according to Fred J. Ehrke, the company's Hillsboro district manager.

The new main will be laid from Cedar Mill, along Cornell and Barnes roads to Hillsboro where it will feed into mains serving the bulk of Washington county, Ehrke announced. Scheduled for completion late this fall, the new six-inch main will have an estimated hourly capacity of 150,000 cubic feet of gas.

The ten miles of main represent the bulk of 13 1/2 miles for which the company signed contracts this week, the other project involving three and one-half miles of six-inch main to serve the many gas-equipped homes in the Park Rose and Rose City Park districts in the Portland area.

Both projects are a part of the company's \$4,750,000.00 production and distribution expansion program for this year, Ehrke said. Total cost of the two main-laying projects will approximate \$165,000.00. P. S. Lord, Inc., is the contractor.

## O. J. Munden, Commits Suicide

Omar John Munden of Jaeger Avenue, Garden Home, committed suicide Thursday morning, Sept. 11, about 8 a. m. asphyxiating himself with carbon monoxide.

He attached a hose to his truck exhaust, closed the garage doors and inhaled the gas.

Despondency over ill health was the cause given, according to J. W. Dierickx, deputy Washington County coroner.

The body was taken to Miller and Tracy, Portland.

Munden is survived by his widow, Pearl Munden, a son and two step-sons.

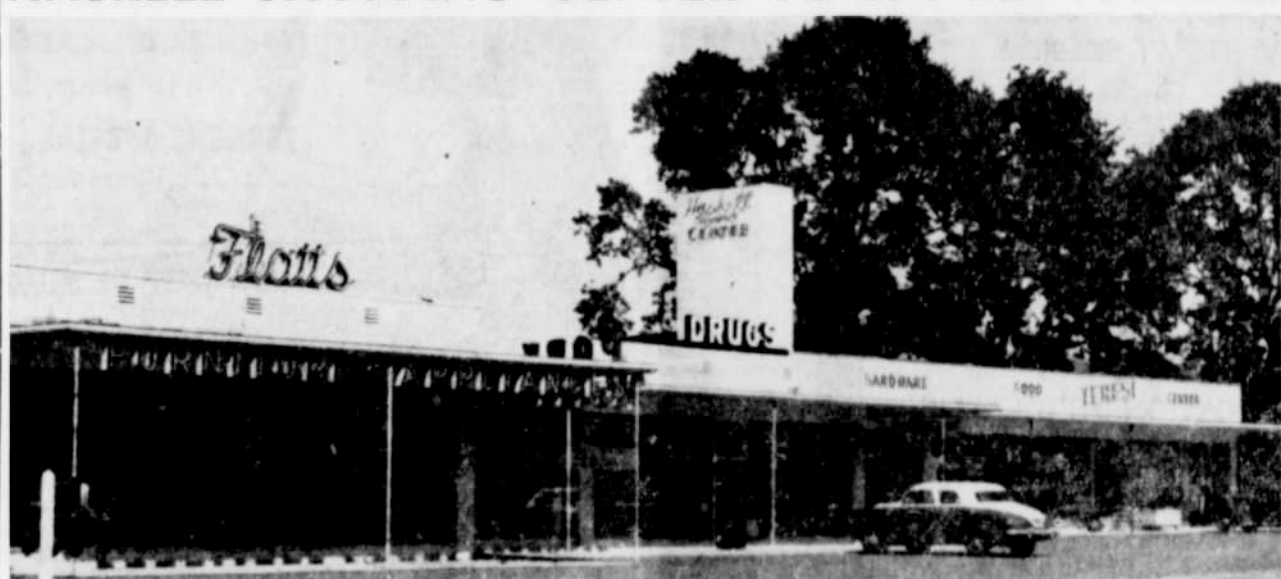
In addition each student will be heard in other romantic or modern numbers.
