10% INCREASE IN GARDEN HOME SCHOOL

Visual Education Equipment Bought By Garden Home

Garden Home school is embarking on an extensive visual education program. They have purchased a 16 m.m. movie projector for either sound or silent film. They have a new mike which attaches to the machine to form a P. A. system to be used in English classes and other uses.

Each class room has dark shades to pull down and a movie screen.

An opaque projector called a Balopticon will show a still of any picture whether in black or white or colored. These may be loose pictures or they may be in a book or magazine.

A SVE slide projector which will show 2-inch slides, colored or black and white, complete the equipment.

Each teacher is instructed in the use of all of the equipment which may be set up in any class room in just a few minutes. The projector and its equipment as well as the Balopticon are mounted on rolling cabinets that only need to be plugged into each room.

Two hundred films, both silent and sound based on the course of study have been spoken for from Oregon State College.

A schedule of the date it is to arrive at the school, whether it is sound or silent, and the title, is on hand now in the office. This schedule has been synchronized with the time schedule in the course of study for it to be taught.

Many subjects on all grade levels have been secured, from one on "Farm Animals," for primary use to "Radio Air Waves," "Micro-Organisms and Disease" and "Precision Basketball" for the upper grades.

"We have no intention of allowing drivers on the streets with no license or one that has expired," the Chief said. "The traffic accident toll demands that regulations be faithfully observed."

All Oregon drivers' licenses numbered between 5R-99,000 and 5R-132,000 must be renewed this month. Permits bearing numbers below 5R-99,000 have already expired.

No individual notice is being mailed to anyone when his driver's license expires.

Thirty Houses Being Built In Kaiser Tract

Kaiser Community Homes, Inc. are pouring foundations at the rate of four or five a week for the construction of 20 new homes in their Pine Hurst addition selected near Jamison Road.

Sixteen of the 20 homes will be ranch type and four Cape Cod. Wolff and Phillips are the architects for the addition. The ranch type houses will be similar in style to the three houses already finished and sold and will have three bedrooms each, while the Cape Cod houses will be two bedroom but will have unfinished attics. The Cape Cods will sell in the neighborhood of \$10,500.

Besides the 20 houses Kaiser is building, 10 lots have been sold to David Farr, a contractor, who is putting up an additional 10 houses, using Kaiser's plans and specifications. His houses are located on both sides of Chestnut street.

All thirty houses are being erected in the north-east end of the addition on 5th Avenue. Cedar, Cherry, and Chestnut streets, which have all been paved by the Porter W. Yett Company.

All of the houses will conform to the contour of the lots on which they are placed. Since the streets are broad and winding the lots are irregular in shape which gives each location individuality.

"Vapor-Seal" a new product is being used in the construction of these houses; in place of ship lap. This insures complete insulation.

Complete plans call for the construction of 1500 houses and a complete business district in the Kaiser addition.
