### Season Opens For Blue Grouse

The season for blue grouse runs concurrently with deer season, October 1 to 20, in the following counties only: Josephine, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Lincoln, Coos, Curry, and that part of Lane and Douglas counties west of U. S. Highway 99. Bag limit is 2 grouse a day but not more than 4 the entire season.
