Any commercial driver whether hired or working for himself, is eligible for the recognition which starts with his nomination by anyone who believes such driver would qualify.

Nominations are forwarded to local chambers of commerce, with names of witnesses included to aid the necessary investigation.

In addition to the monthly prize, a grand prize of "substantial" nature is promised at the end of the year.

The Oregon Motor Transport Association which sponsors the contest, presents duly embossed certificates to the winners, in an attempt to do something tangible for commercial drivers whose conduct on the highways show a remarkable record.

A five man board of judges makes the monthly selection on the basis of nominations received.
