Separate funeral rites, on Tuesday, October 21, marked the final chapter of Beaverton's recent shocking tragedy that claimed the lives of Wilmer LeRoy Hadley and Harold Warren Dobyns, Jr., two youthful flyers, when their plane crashed in a plowed field between Tualatin and Stafford, some 20 miles from Portland, October 17.

In Beaverton, services were held for Wilmer LeRoy Hadley, born June 29, 1926, at St. Johns, Portland. Unmarried, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Hadley, 145-10th street, Beaverton; two brothers, Clarence, Long Beach, Washington, and Kenneth, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and a sister, Mrs. Gladys Oliver, Middletown, Ohio.

Serving in the U. S. Army infantry for two years from September '44, he was baptized into the Methodist church by Chaplain S. I. Acheson, USNR, on the Navy Transport Sea Runner.

A member of Beaverton Post No. 124, American Legion, he was honored in his last rites by the attendance in a group of some of his fellow members.

Services honoring Harold Warren Dobyns, Jr., were held at 1:00 p. m., Tuesday at the A. J. ## Grade School Here Host To All Teachers

All grade school teachers of the county in systems of five teachers or more will spend a full day, October 27, at the Beaverton grade school, in an institute called by County Superintendent of Schools, Austin Serafford. The conference will begin at 9 a. m.

Lead speaker for the gathering will be Frank Bennett, superintendent of the city schools of Salem.

The program will be handled by sectional meetings of four parts; 1st and 2nd grades; 3rd and 4th grades; 5th and 6th grades and 7th and 8th grades.

Program for the 1-2 grades will include presentations by Elizabeth Rader, state department of education and Billie Slumberber, demonstrator for Scott-Forsman publishing company, the latter to give demonstrations on science for both the 1-2 and the 3-4 groups.

Miss Lucille Hill, physical educational supervisor for the Portland public schools, will demonstrate rhythms for the 1-2 and 5-6 sections.

Miss Neva Dallas, state department of education, elementary supervisor, will lead a discussion on arithmetic for the 3-4 grades.

Miss May Lindsay, teacher in the Portland public school system, will demonstrate social studies for the 5-6 grades and the 7-8 group.

Henrietta Wolfar, supervisor of the independent training school for Oregon College of Education will demonstrate on Language Arts.

Lunch will be served to teachers attending the institute, of whom 125 are expected.

Except for some groups who will be used in demonstrations, school children will have the full day off.

Likewise, on Monday, all high school teachers will journey to Milwaukie to start a two-day institute for secondary teachers.
