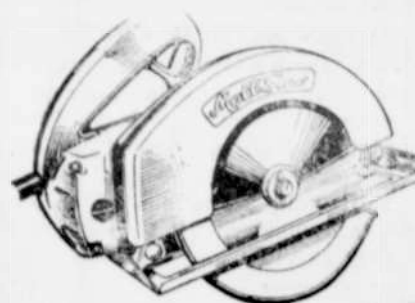

Winter weather is now driving rats from the fields into buildings and other areas of protection and, therefore, now is the best time to put out rat bait, according to Palmer S. Torvond, county agent.

are on the market which work satisfactorily if properly used, or a specially prepared bait can be obtained at the county extension office at cost. Some commercial dealers in the county also intend to handle this rat poison on the same basis that squirrel poison has been handled in the past.



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
