

Beaverton Hosts Poultry Meeting January 20, P. M.

Dr. J. E. Parker, head of the Department of Poultry Husbandry, OSC, will meet with Washington county poultrymen on Thursday, January 22, at the second of a winter series of winter poultry meetings to be held in Beaverton and Forest Grove. The meeting in Forest Grove begins at 2 p. m. in the city hall. The evening meeting in Beaverton will be held at the high school beginning at 8 p. m., reports Wilbur W. Burkhardt, assistant county agent.

Dr. Parker will tell of the poultry research work at Oregon State College and assist poultrymen with their chick brooding problems. All poultrymen are urged to attend.

Mark Campbell's Funeral Ends 40 Years Lumbering

The end of a long career of business activity was marked on January 7, in the Morning Light chapel of J. P. Finley and Sons, with the last rites for Mark D. Campbell, 57, of the West Slope Lumber company, who died on January 3 in Phoenix, Arizona, while on vacation. Reverend M. E. Moss was in charge of the services while Friendship Lodge 160, A. F. & A. M., conducted commitment rites at Riverview Abbey Mausoleum.

Mr. Campbell was born on August 26, 1890, in Rock Valley, Iowa. He moved west about 1906 and was engaged in the lumber business for about 40 years. Starting with the Standard Box Lumber company, he then joined Charles R. McCormick company.

In 1934, he started his own concern, Campbell and Moore. Then, in 1938, he established the firm of Campbell-Conro Lumber company. Three or four years ago, his establishment of the West Slope Lumber company brought him into the Tualatin Valley.

Survivors include his wife, Florence, son Floyd W., and brother Paul Campbell, all of Portland; two sisters, Mrs. Helen McDonald, Seattle, and Mrs. Florence Potts, Chehalis; two step sons, Don and Glen Tenney, Portland.

Baptists Decide New Name, Pick Church Location

The name, Canyon Road Baptist Church, was adopted, Sunday, January 11, by the new group recently organized to serve the West Slope-Beaverton-Cedar Hills area, at a special business meeting held in the Odd Fellows hall of Beaverton.

Report of committee on Constitution was presented by Mr. Eugene Crosby and adopted with very little change. The group voted to make regular monthly contributions to the Portland Baptist City Mission Society toward the support of their pastor, city missionary, Rev. Russell B. Thomas.

Building committee, headed by Mr. Oscar Kruger, reviewed plans for the building to be erected in the next few months on a lot at McLain Drive and Canyon Road, about a mile east of Beaverton. The first unit of this building will be a 30x50 foot chapel, constructed on simple lines, with full basement providing for an assembly hall for social purposes and rooms for Sunday school departments and classes.

The sanctuary will seat 100, with room for about 45 more in the balcony and choir. Mr. Walter E. Kelly, architect, is now drawing up final plans for the chapel, which is expected to be built of pumice blocks on a poured concrete foundation, and be finished off with a slender spire of copper aluminum. Total cost, when finished, is estimated at \$25,000.

A business meeting will be held on Sunday, January 25, at 11 a. m., for the election of church officers, and a baptismal service is being planned for the afternoon of that Sunday in the First Baptist church of Portland. Thirty-one adults representing 20 families are now enrolled, and eleven are to be baptized. The charter is being held open until April 30, so that others may join as charter members.

Services are held every Sunday at 11 a. m. with Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. in the old Odd Fellows hall, 53 North Broadway, in Beaverton, between Hall street and the railroad, opposite the Beaver theatre. Everybody is welcome at all services.

Lure Of Foreign Places Brightens By Overseas Jobs

The romantic urge to travel to a foreign field and combine it with broadening travel and experience, gets a bright boost for some who are qualified for overseas government jobs according to a release received. Most overseas government jobs are with the Department of the Army, and the work is varied. Pay is usually about 25 percent higher than for similar government jobs in the United States. Living costs compare usually reasonable. Housing for dependents, however, is practically unavailable.

In most places, contracts run for two years, although in less desirable spots, one year is the life of the contract, renewable of course.

For unskilled or semi-skilled classifications, there are practically no jobs at all. Greatest demand is for technical personnel, typists or stenographers and various kinds of skilled tradesmen.

A "full dress rehearsal" of the committee recommendations, as well as a definite picture of the costs involved, had been announced as the club's great expectation.

Within a week or ten days, after city attorney Paul Patterson has had time to survey committee recommendations in a legal light, the city council will receive recommendations from the group and full report will also be made to the public.

The Kiwanis club, prior to the recent issue of annexation, accepted the challenge to leadership in community affairs. Their response to the need showed some reflection in the successful manner by which the annexation of Pinehurst—and its broader aspect of beginning progress for Beaverton—was accepted.

BOND ELECTION ON JAN. 19

Census Forecasts Immediate Boost For Student Requirements Of District No. 48

Board Warns Construction Only Answer

Final census figures for 1947 show an immediate boost in student requirements for school district 48, which will begin to show in first grade enrollment increases during the next three years.

For the past year, the school district has had to provide three beginner classes. Figures on the number of youngsters, age from three to five, indicates that at least one more room is the absolute minimum required by the next two years, in the first grade.

Elementary school standards, approved by the state board of education, September 17, 1947, declares the maximum pupil load per teacher in grades 1, 2 and 3 must not exceed 25, and in grades 4 to 8, the maximum load is 30.

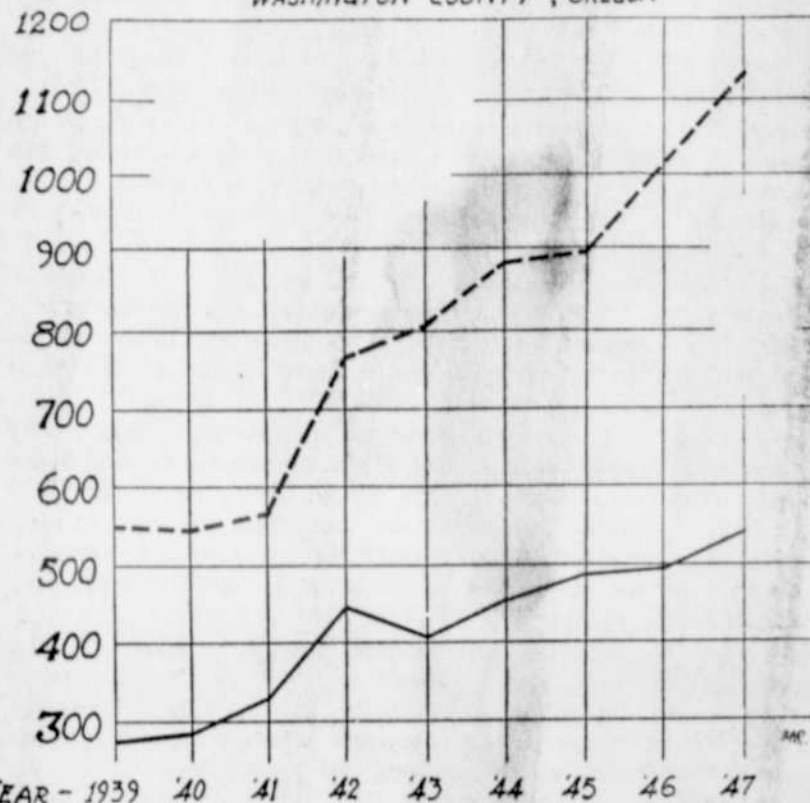
At present, with a stated maximum of 25 each, district 48's three first grade classes are 22 pupils each; 2nd grade has two of 33 pupils and one of 20—cramped by lack of space in the latter instance—and third grade classes are 20, 26 and 28.

Fourth grade classes, number 39 and 39 while 5th grade enrollment results in two classes of 40 each. Other three grades are likewise subject to such heavy enrollment that the students have been divided into two sections for each grade.

The graph, herewith reprinted, emphasizes the upward trend in school-age population and school enrollment. Population count is of all between the ages of 4 to 19 years inclusive. Pinehurst addition has not been listed in the census for district 48.

School board members declare that the bond election called for January 19 has no alternative, in

the light of census facts which—even if there were no further population growth—would demand what additional facilities are planned.

In spite of high building costs, there seems no satisfactory alternative to the new school. State minimum requirements if ignored by any school district, will mean a forfeit of funds allocated under the basic school support law.

For the convenience of electors within the school district, voting qualifications are again summarized:

Any resident of the state, 21 years of age or older, who has lived in district 48 thirty days

immediately preceding the election and who has property in the district as shown by the last county assessment, on which she or he is liable to pay a tax, shall be entitled to a ballot.

Evidence of stock, shares or ownership in any corporation, firm or copartnership, any of which has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment and which is liable for tax, will be accepted as property qualification.

Voting will take place at the Beaverton grade school, between the hours of 2 p. m. and 7 p. m., January 19.

PTA Executive Board Asks Success Of Bond Election

SCHOOL DISTRICT 48 FACES CRISIS WITH NO FACILITIES FOR POPULATION INCREASE

The executive board of the Beaverton Grade School P. T. A., which met on January 8 at the home of Mrs. Newman Ward on Wilson avenue totaled 25, including the officers, committee chairmen and their assistants and room mothers.

Mr. Maurice Romig, member of the school board, attended the first part of the meeting and discussed the importance of the school bond election to be held at the grade school on January 19 between the hours of 2:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m.

Mr. Romig disclosed in detail the over-crowded conditions at the grade school, which was originally intended to house 450 and now has 541 students enrolled with almost daily additions. Rooms built to accommodate not over 30 to 35 each and rooms intended, equipped and badly needed for other purposes are now being used as school rooms. These conditions work a hardship on the teachers, and if not corrected, will make procurement of teachers, of which there is a nation-wide shortage, a most difficult feat.

These conditions, if allowed to continue, will automatically eliminate any financial aid to be received from Oregon's Basic School fund. Recent census proves that at the rate this area is growing in population, at least two more rooms each year will be necessary, as many more pupils are enrolled each fall than are graduated in the spring.

The school board, according to their spokesman, feels that another grade school, not a different school, but an additional school is the simplest solution to this ever-growing problem. Grounds for additional school have been procured and await development. An additional school will not only correct the present deplorable conditions, but will prevent recurrence for a substantial period of time for the future.

The public is reminded that this election concerns not only the Beaverton voters, but all residents of school district 48.

The minutes of the previous board meeting were read by Mrs. Robert Besmehn, secretary, and approved. Mrs. Charles Drew, membership chairman, reported enrollment of four new members and Mrs. Harris Hansen, chairman of character building organizations, again asked aid in securing leaders for Camp Fire girls, Bluebirds and Cub Scouts.

Mrs. Maurice Romig, program chairman, discussed plans for the January business meeting program which will be disclosed in next week's paper.

It was decided that since the executive board had grown too large to meet at the various homes, it will hereafter be held at the grade school.

Refreshments were then served by the hostess and the meeting broke up.

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
