Vets' Job Rights Get Helping Hand of Three Agencies

A co-ordinated plan for guaranteeing the re-employment rights of Oregon veterans, made possible by co-operation of three state and federal agencies and the county service officers, will go into effect on January 10, according to Howard M. Gray, field representative for the Veterans' Reemployment Rights division of the United States Department of Labor.

Participating agencies are the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, the federal reemployment rights division, and the Oregon State Unemployment Compensation Commission, whose 29 local offices will handle initial contacts with veterans.

Seniority rights, inability to get back jobs held prior to entering service, discharges before the end of a year of employment and similar disputes are among the problems faced by returning servicemen. Statewide assistance to those eligible for such rights under the selective service act will be available when needed, Gray emphasized.

In the operation of the plan, veterans will need only contact the veterans employment representative of the nearest office of the state Unemployment Com-

Rabbit Raisers Seek To Better Small Breeders

With a rabbit supper, open to the public, scheduled for January 20, at 4515 S. E. 65th Avenue, Portland, from 5:30 to 7:30 p. m., the Northwest Rabbit Co-operative Association hopes to attract the interest of small breeders who are interested in more generous success for their efforts, according to Hubert M. Hobbs, secretary-treasurer, of Beaverton.

The association, Mr. Hobbs relates, started slaughtering rabbits, under its marketing set-up, on November 20. Since that time, more than 800 have been processed for the market.

With 24 raisers already in the fold, the association is growing with 5 or 6 more expected to sign by time of next meeting. It has purchased an acre of ground at 16335 S. E. Main street and building materials. In about three weeks, it hopes to have its own building finished and ready for use.

The organization is a non-profit group which acts on the assumption that co-operative efforts will bring a fairer share of returns to raisers, Mr. Hobbs states. Dividends, in the way of periodic profit tallies, are distributed among the co-op members.

At the January 20 meeting, which follows the dinner, new members will be welcomed with all ideas they may have to offer. The group specializes in the slaughtering of fryer rabbits for the market.

Sometime in March, Dr. Chap-

man, of Oregon State College, has been scheduled for an educational talk on diseases of rabbits. Membership representations include Portland, Boring, Beaverton, Oswego, Estacada and other points. The organization is registered under Oregon state law as a non-profit business.
