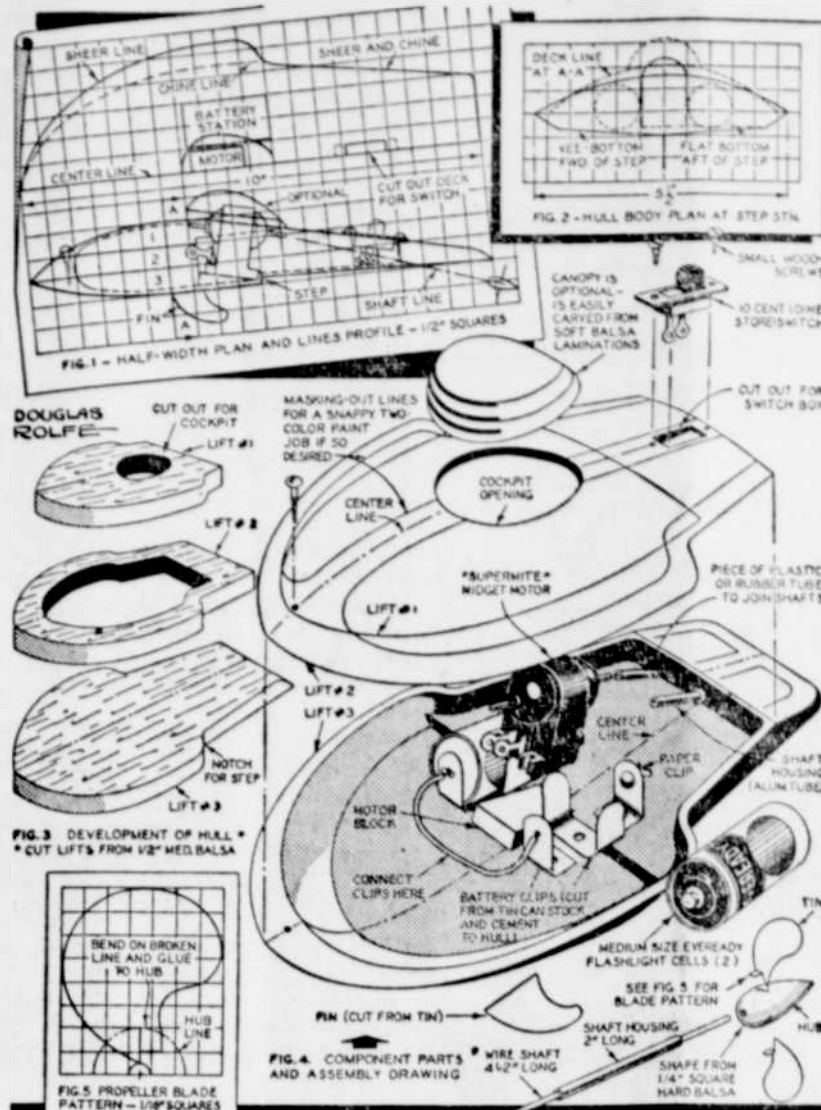
COMMUNITY WILL SING

10-INCH SPEEDBOAT

Budget: Dad, \$3.00 for motor—Son, 55c for materials

Dear Dad:

The hull is carved. The Super-mite motor is driven by one or two Eveready flashlight batteries.

First, lay out full-size patterns of the hull (Figures 1 and 2). The hull is built in three "lifts." The two upper lifts are to be cemented together to form the removable deck section. The lower lift forms the actual hull. Figure 3 shows how the lifts are assembled. Pin them together temporarily and carve the outside to shape. Figure 3 shows a typical section through the hull. After shaping the outside, separate the pieces and hollow out the upper and lower lifts. Cement the two lower lifts together and, when they are dry, hollow out No. 2 lift to conform with lift No. 3. Put in the motor block and the battery clips and fit the switch as shown in Figure 4. In making the connections, allow enough wire so that the deck portion can be raised to replace batteries. Put in the propeller shaft housing. This may be any piece of metal tubing of just the

right size to allow an easy fit for the shaft. Make the propeller as shown in Figs. 4 and 5 and mount it on the shaft with cement. Hook up the propeller shaft to the motor shaft with a short length of plastic or rubber tubing.

Next cut out the fin and press it into the bottom just ahead of the step station. Later it can be cemented in place; but first sand down the entire hull with very fine sandpaper. Give the whole works a coat of sanding sealer (costs 10c) and sand down again. The paint job is up to the builder. Masking-out lines are indicated for a two-tone desk, paint job; but this is not essential. Nor is the motor hood or canopy, also indicated; but this detail improves the appearance of the boat and seals it against water damage to the batteries. Check any tendency to turn off course by bending the fin as needed and . . . let her go.

4H And FFA Clubs Will Participate In Guernsey Sale

Thirty-five registered Guernsey heifers have been selected from the best herds throughout the State of Oregon for the second 4-H club and FFA members heifer sale. They will be sold at auction March 20, 1948 at the Fair Grounds in Salem.

Last year's sale, sponsored by the Oregon Guernsey Breeders' association, was so successful in

placing high quality Guernsey heifers in the hands of 4-H club and FFA members, that they are going to repeat this year.

Only one or two of the best heifers from any herd were accepted. All are backed by the production records, breeding and type inheritance to make them particularly suitable as foundation animals. In all cases, dams were checked carefully and in many cases grand-dams were available for inspection. General appearance of half-sisters was considered and maternal sisters, especially, when they were available. Out of the thirty-five head to be offered for sale, most of them will be yearlings and senior calves, with four or five bred heifers due to freshen this summer and fall.

Bidding at this sale will be limited to bona fide 4-H and FFA members. The junior sale program will get under way at 10:30 a. m., with a preview of the heifers and educational features. Sale will start at 1:00 p. m. on Saturday, March 20, 1948 at the State Fair Grounds, Salem, Ore.

Three Projects In Northwest To Mean Hospitals

Construction of three hospital projects, already authorized by congress, will be commenced in the Pacific Northwest in the near future, the VA has announced. A total of 650 beds for veterans will be added by the program.

Ground is to be broken for construction of the 300-bed general medical and surgical hospital at Seattle in June or July, according to an announcement last week by Col. L. E. Hewitt, district army engineer.

Bids for construction of Spokane's 200-bed hospital will be opened late in February, Col. Hewitt said. On the same date the VA will also open bids on a 150-bed addition to the Portland hospital, to care for veterans suffering from tuberculosis. Other hospitals on the VA hospital construction program, for which plans are now being drawn, are to be located at Klamath Falls, Ore., and Miles City, Montana.

VA Gives Liberal Insurance Terms In Reinstatement

World War II veterans now have the privilege of reinstating lapsed National Service Life Insurance without a physical examination until July 31, 1948, the Veterans Administration has announced.

All term policies may be reinstated upon payment of two months' premium with a signed statement to the effect that the veteran is in as good health as at the time of lapse.

During the month of December 4329 Pacific Northwest veterans reinstated insurance with a face value of \$31,581,500. In the past 11 months 53,019 policies have been reinstated for a total of \$362,186,000.
