**Beaverton Doctor Finds Abandoned Babe On Doorstep**

In a torrential rain, Sunday, January 4, a foundling babe, about six months of age, was left on the doorstep of Dr. N. E. Johnson, on Canyon Road near the East "Y", Beaverton. Accompanying the foundling was a note, written in a cramped hand, beseeching the doctor to find a good home in which better things might be in prospect.

Touched by the note, and the beguiling personality of the ransoaked urchin, Dr. Johnson reports that he will try to place the foundling, whose only reported name is Betsy, in a private home where she may have the advantages of a proper upbringing. He stoutly maintains he will not attempt to make a placement through a social agency. Rather, by exhaustive investigation, he maintains he will be as well qualified as social workers in judging family backgrounds to ensure Betsy a good home.

He estimates her age to be about six months. Her hair is medium long and, perhaps because of the harrowing experience in connection with her abandonment, is almost entirely white. Only on the forehead and both ears is the hair black . . . and her tall is long.

Anyone whose heart is touched by the sad abandonment of the foundling and who will be willing to make a place in his home, is asked to contact Dr. N. E. Johnson, at the veterinarian hospital near Haskell center.

Even a mongrel dog, the doctor says, may develop into a treasured pet.
